Loss of Crew.
GLoucester, Sept. 7.

A German Barque Abandoned.
LONDON, Sept. 7.

The German barque "Kathinka," from Hamburg August 20, for Port Royal, was abandoned on the 2nd inst. Her crew arrived at Milford, Haven.

Canadian Immigration.

Earthquake in Germany.
BERLIN, Sept. 7.

Several shocks of earthquake were felt at Dusseldorf on Tuesday night, but no damage ensued.

Earl Carnarvon will be the guest of Sir John McDonald during his stay in Ottawa.

Ischia Alarmed.
NAPLES, Sept. 7.

A shock of earthquake was felt at Ischia again and caused much alarm.

Telegraph Notes.

The Queen has conferred the blue ribbon of the order of the garter upon Prince Albert Victor, son of the Prince of Wales.

A despatch from Hong Kong states that the reported crossing of the frontier of Tonquin by Chinese troops is as yet unconfirmed.

A telegram from the Governor General of the Dutch East Indies says that the bays within the area of a recent volcanic disturbance are filled with banks of pumice stone.

The temple of Boro Budder, in Java, the largest Buddhist temple in the East, was destroyed by falling rocks. Thirteen thousand florins have been sent to Batavia by telegraph for the relief of the district.

The police are in possession of facts which show a revival of Fenian activity in London. All noted rendezvous of prominent Irish agitators have again been placed under strict police surveillance.

The Count of Paris arrived at the French capital on the 5th inst. The Temps reports that the Count of Chambord left 60,000,000 francs, which are to be divided between the Duke of Parma and the Count of Bardi.

Anti-Magyar disorders broke out at Beduja on the 5th inst., and troops were called on to restore order. A conflict arose between a mob of peasants and a troop of Hussars, and the latter were obliged to retreat for reinforcements. The peasants then attacked a body of infantry and several persons were killed and wounded on both sides.

The Chinese legation at Paris is still without any official information in regard to the reported massing of Chinese troops on the Tonquin frontier. It is admitted, however, by the members of the embassy that if the French Asiatic squadron has been charged with the duty of notifying China of the signing of the treaty the situation might be greatly complicated thereby.

CURRENT NOTES.

The Prince and Princess of Wales will not visit Scotland this year.

The number of deaths from cholera in Egypt is reported as 27,318.

The Queen sent a bouquet of lilies to be placed on DeChambord's coffin.

Drought in Virginia is doing much damage to the cotton, tobacco and corn crops.

The treaty of commerce between Germany and Spain has been passed by the Reichstag.

The United States mercantile agencies report fewer failures and prospects generally brightening.

General Grant persists in wearing an old-fashioned watch fob, and is very particular about the way it sits.

The Earl and Countess of Carnarvon remain the guests of the Governor-General at the Citadel, Quebec.

Over one hundred thousand copies have been sold of a penny edition of Oliver Twist, published in Liverpool.

The French general in Tonquin has demanded a reinforcement of 5,000 men. All the ports of Annam are declared to be blockaded.

A severe hurricane was experienced in Paris on Sunday, which spoiled the success of an entertainment to have been given in aid of the poor.

Fifteen thousand Chinese troops are reported as proceeding to Naidnong. A Chinese squadron is also landing at Shanghai with troops, ammunition, and torpedoes.

The Canadian Pacific Railway Company for their exhibit at the International Exhibition at Amsterdam have been awarded a diploma of honour, which is the highest award.

Mr. Shaw, the Madagascar missionary, states that while in custody of the French at Tamatave he was denied access to papers containing the charges against him, and was never informed of what he was accused.

The Grit officials at Rat Portage are stated to be privately promising titles to owners of mining and other claims on Lake of the Woods on condition of supporting the Mowat candidate in Algoma.

Dr. Joseph Williams, aged 35, a Boston physician, formerly of Montreal, has been arrested for criminally assaulting a twelve-year-old girl sent to get him to attend her sick brother. He has confessed the crime.

There is consternation among the Mowat party at Rat Portage on finding that there is no appeal in the case of the Grit special sent to Winnipeg gaol for six months, and that their pets must serve their time in prison.

London World hears that the Queen was anxious to invest Miss Florence Nightingale with the new Order of the Red Cross, and invited her to Osborne for the purpose; but the heroine of the Crimean War begged to be excused on the score of ill-health.

About a year ago a manufacturing company in Williamsham, Conn., gave notice that after the expiration of twelve months no employes would be retained in the mills who could not read and write. Evening schools were established. The few who neglected to learn to read and write have received notice of their dismissal.

Lord "Charley" Beresford, who gained much applause by his dare-devil bravery at the bombardment of Alexandria, is noted for eccentricity in making presents. Not long ago he gave the Princess of Wales a particularly vicious, sandy-colored bull-dog, and he once sent a young bride, as a wedding gift, a set of four silver salt cellars shaped like cradles, with pap-spoons to accompany them.

Her Majesty proposes to have the elegy which Mr. Tennyson is to compose in memory of the late John Brown engraved on the various tombstones, brasses, and tablets which are to be erected in honor of "the Highlander," as he used to be called by the court. The extent of the arrangements which are in progress with the view of keeping John Brown's memory green is beyond all belief. By the way, it is hinted that Mr. Tennyson has no relish for the task the Queen has imposed upon him.

Captain Webb's death at Niagara recalls the similar fate of a man in Sicily just 100 years ago. Nicholas, surnamed "the Diver," on account of his many wonderful exploits, undertook, in the presence of thousands of spectators, to dive to the bottom of the Sicilian Gulf, where there is a dangerous whirlpool, and bring up something which had been thrown in. He made the attempt and succeeded. Again something more precious was thrown in, and he again succeeded. Finding that in the second attempt he encountered some submarine difficulties which he had not expected, he declined to make another attempt, but a Sicilian noble throwing in a gold cup studded with brilliants as the prize, he dived into the gulf and was never seen again.
