A By-Law Relating to Horses and Carriages, and for the Purpose of Taxing the same.

BE it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown, as follows:—

1st. There shall be paid by every person a resident of said City, and being the owner or keeper of all Horses, Carriages and Sleighs kept or used for the purpose of pleasure or profit within the limits of the City of Charlottetown, the following annual assessment of Tax, that is to say: The sum of two dollars for each and every horse so kept for pleasure or profit as aforesaid, and the sum of one dollar for each and every carriage or sleigh so kept as aforesaid, provided, always that no person shall be liable to pay the tax hereby imposed for more carriages or for more sleighs than the number of horses owned by him.

2. The following notice and certificate shall be deposited with every person owning or being the owner or keeper of such horse, carriage and sleigh by the City Collector or other person duly authorized:

Horses and Carriage Tax. You are hereby required to give a just and true account of all horses, carriages and sleighs owned or kept by you for the purpose of pleasure or profit. The following certificate is left with you to be filled up and transmitted to me within six days from the delivery thereof. Dated this day of A. D. 18

FORM OF RETURN. I certify that the number of horses, carriages and sleighs owned or kept by me for pleasure or profit since the first day of A. E. 188 is or are

3. Any person or persons keeping or owning any horse, carriage or sleigh, and who shall neglect or refuse to make due return thereof within the time specified, or who shall give a false statement relative to the number of horses, carriages or sleighs owned or kept by him, shall be subject to the penalties of this By-Law.

4. Any person becoming possessed of or of owning or keeping any horse, carriage or sleigh during any part of the period between the first day of January, 1881, and the thirty-first day of December, A. D. 1881, or during part of any succeeding year thereafter, beginning and ending as aforesaid, shall be liable to the tax on such horse, carriage and sleigh imposed by this By-Law as if he had possessed, owned or kept such horse, carriage or sleigh for a whole year, and the Collector thereof is hereby empowered and required to demand and enforce such Tax of and from the owner or keeper of such horse, carriage and sleigh.

5. The tax aforesaid shall be paid on or before the expiration of ten days after it has been applied for by the collector or other person duly authorized, and in default of payment of all persons owning or keeping horses, carriages and sleighs shall be sued for the amount of the tax or assessment on the same in the City Court of the City of Charlottetown at the suit of the City of Charlottetown, and on judgment being given execution shall issue in the usual manner.

6. Horses and Trucks owned and used by Licensed Truckmen, are hereby exempted from taxation.

7. Any person or persons guilty of an infraction of the provisions of this By-Law, shall, upon conviction in the City Court of the Stipendiary Magistrate, on the oath or affirmation of any credible witness, forfeit and pay at the discretion of the said Magistrate, a penalty not exceeding the sum of thirty dollars for each offence, exclusive of costs, and in default of payment thereof it shall and may be lawful for the said Magistrate to commit the offender or offenders to the common jail of the said city for any period not exceeding thirty days, unless the said penalty and costs be sooner paid.

A By-Law for allowing a Rate of Discount on the Assessments on Real Estate and Incomes for the current year.

BE it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown as follows:—

1. A discount at the rate of two and one-half per cent shall be allowed to all taxpayers who shall, on or before the Twentieth day of June, A. D. 1881, pay to the City Clerk, at his office, the taxes severally due by them for the current year on Real Estate and Incomes. [L. S.] (Sgd) W. E. DAWSON, Mayor of the City of Ch'town. [L. S.] W. M. A By-Law for levying and specifying the rate of an Assessment on real estate and incomes in the City of Charlottetown:—

BE it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown as follows:—

1. The rate of assessment for the year commencing the 1st day of January, A. D. 1881, and ending 31st December, 1881, is hereby specified and fixed at the rate of one and one-quarter cent on every dollar of the value of real estate within the City of Charlottetown, according to the valuation of such real estate as assessed by the assessors of the said City in their valuation roll of such real estate, made and duly returned by them on the eighth day of April, A. D. 1881.

2. The rate of assessment for the year commencing the 1st day of January, A. D. 1881, and ending 31st December, A. D. 1881, is hereby specified and fixed at the rate of one cent on every dollar of the amount of the net yearly income, salaries or receipts of all persons, partnerships and corporations, as assessed by the Assessors of the said City in their valuation rolls of such income tax, made and duly returned by them on the 11th day of April, A. TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND.

MITCHELLSTOWN, Co. Cork, May 28.

A serious affray took place here on Friday, in consequence of the attempt of the Sheriff to evict five tenants on the estate of the Countess of Kingston. The sheriff was assisted by 250 police and military, including a troop of dragoons, but the resistance of the people was so determined that the work was only partly accomplished. The chapel bell of Mitchellstown began ringing in the morning to warn the country that evictions were about to begin. The chapel bells ten miles around took up the refrain, calling the population to assemble. The police attempted to stop the bells but did not succeed. Ten thousand persons assembled here in less than an hour. A large number gathered round the police and military. While the first eviction was proceeding, eggs, stones and other missiles were thrown at the sheriff and his assistants. Three evictions were carried out, to execute the next two it was necessary to pass through the town. The people obstructed and sent showers of stones into the constabulary. The cavalry charged and drove them back, but they only returned in greater force and with new daring. While passing a yard behind which a large number of rioters were concealed, a heavy volley of stones was delivered and one of the cavalry horses was killed. The police charged through the yard and dispersed the assailants at the point of the bayonet. Several were wounded. One man's jaw was cut open. Twelve soldiers were struck and many police were injured. The Riot Act was read twice without effect, and in consequence of the resistance it was decided not to proceed further with the work of evictions. The excitement lasted late into the night, but there was no further disturbance.

DUBLIN, May 29.

The past week has been one of grave anxiety and alarm to the authorities of Ireland. The situation cannot last. The police are rapidly becoming demoralized. Every man's hand is against them. After a long and fatiguing march they find in some country village that the walls are defiled with mud and rubbish, so that no man can quench his thirst. No patrol can venture far except in great force. At night the country is left in the hands of marauders who carry on their lawless practices with the utmost impunity. The governing powers are almost helpless.

LONDON, May 29.

The Kilmallock Land League started a movement for presenting Father Sheehy, the imprisoned priest, with a national testimonial. At a land meeting at Duncannon, Count Westford, to-day, Canon D. Oyle, who presided, said the Land Bill was one of the greatest shams ever passed through the House of Commons. A man named Dewessey, a farmer, who took land from which a tenant had been evicted, was fired at from behind a hedge in the County Galway and was killed.

EUROPE AND THE EAST.

BERLIN, May 28.

During the adjourned debate in the Reichstag on incorporating Hamburg in the Zollverein, a motion to Windthorst was carried requesting customs arrangements with Hamburg until the pending discussions were concluded, as the Government had made no official communication to the Reichstag in regard to the signature of the Hamburg convention. The debate proceeded, the result of which can only be regarded as a piece of ex post facto legislation which will never come to be applied.

PARIS, May 28.

Count Francois Xavier de Cassabianca, the French statesman, is dead.

LONDON, May 28.

Earl Camperdown will probably succeed to the Governorship of Madras Presidency, made vacant by the death of Governor Adam. The Standard publishes the following: Our Tunis correspondent wires he was summoned to the telegraph office to receive the price of thirteen messages not forwarded. On inquiry he was told the telegrams were despatched from Tunis, but stopped at Paris by order of the Government.

UNITED STATES.

NEW YORK, May 29.

Ex-Governor Tilden says under no circumstances would he be a candidate for the U. S. Senate. He says the most honorable course for the Democratic party is to refer the representation of New York in the Senate to the action of the people in the fall elections. The Commissioners of Emigration are investigating charges of bad treatment made by emigrants against the various steamship companies. The Cornell crew have decided to go to England to-day, in hopes to be allowed to enter the Henley regatta. Win H. Vanderbilt, who arrived from Europe yesterday, said to a reporter that Conkling had made a grave mistake in resigning. He left the State without representation and the Republicans in the minority. When the question shall be submitted to the people, whether to follow the party or Conkling, the people will rally together around the party. Conkling will find himself alone.

DENVER, Col., May 28.

The following particulars of the collision on the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad, have been received: The construction train

was backing north from the Granda when the south bound freight train suddenly rounded a curve and crashed into the caboose of the construction train, containing twenty men, killing one and injuring ten others.

ST. LOUIS, May 29.

The Collier White Lead and Oil Company has been burned. There is an immense loss in property and consequent suspension of business.

NEWARK, N. J., May 29.

Mrs. Rosa Taylor, an aged widow, was arrested to-day for throwing a paving stone in a fit of anger at Michael McCarthy, aged ten years. The stone fractured the boy's skull; he is dying.

BRISTOL, Tenn., May 28.

Jim Baker shot and killed Alexander Osborne and two Reynor brothers, and mortally wounded another man, name unknown, at Osborn's Ford, Scott county, V., on the 26th. Jim Stapleton killed Sam Kilgors with a knife at Mickellsville the same day. The difficulties grew out of the Municipal election that day.
