Mass Marriage Transportation Problem Met

"How can we get transportation for 105 brides and grooms, 210 witnesses, and the numerous church dignitaries who will be present?"

That was one of the hundred and one details facing Father Roy St. James Basilica from there to Ouvreire Catholique, sponsors of the mass marriage of 105 young couples to be held on Sunday next at Montreal's stadium.

Discovered today at his desk at J.O.C. headquarters, quietly directing the unnumbered last-minute arrangements for the monster ceremony, Father Roy pointed to this as typical problem which has been solved, in his own words, by the "universal goodwill and interest which is being shown on all sides in connection with the marriage of these 210 young people."

He announced that General Motors Products of Canada had come forward and, through its dealers, placed 10 cars at his disposal for the history-making occasion.

Driven by General Motors chauffeurs, the cars will pick up their passengers and transport them to St. James Basilica from there to the Windsor Hotel, where the matrimonial registers will be signed, and then, with police escort, to the stadium, where the cars will drive right into the amphitheatre.

Following the open-air marriage, at which Mass will be celebrated by Father Roy and the sermon delivered by His Excellency Msgr. Georges Grathier, Archbishop-Adjutor of Montreal, the cars and their escort will form a procession for the trip to St. Helen's Island and following supper there will transport the brides and grooms back to the stadium for the closing ceremony.

Empire Schools Exchange News

(By The Canadian Press)
 LONDON, July 20—An Empire service for 150 schools scattered over Canada, South Africa, Malaya, Borneo, Falkland Islands, India and Britain has been inaugurated by the Empire Article Exchange Society.

Student reporters and photographers cover what interests them and send their copy to the editor, J. B. Dempster, headmaster of Milbank Elementary School, Westminster. He turns out a newspaper which is sent to the 150 schools.

The big story in a recent edition was a report of how 17 boys and girls from a one-roomed country school in Saskatchewan travelled 250 miles over difficult country for a brief glimpse of the King and Queen in the royal train touring Canada.

U. S. Band Leader Hauled Into Court

WEBSTER, Mass., July 20 (AP)—Fritz Kuhn, German-American band leader, pleaded guilty today to being drunk and profane, but reversed his field after paying \$5 fine and declared he was sober linguistically as well as personally during his recent argument with a Webster cop.

"I at no time acted boisterously and directed no profanity at any person," insisted the stocky Nazi leader in a formal statement issued not long after he left district court.

"In consideration of the decided hostility shown by the arresting officer and of the prejudicial atmosphere created before the trial I pleaded guilty to the charge of drunkenness and profanity as the best means of avoiding a theatrical performance."

Alberta Discusses Debt Cancellations

EDMONTON, July 20 (CP)—The Alberta Government is negotiating with the Dominion government regarding debt cancellations where both governments are involved, said Hon. Lucien Maynard, Alberta Minister of Municipal Affairs, today.

The Alberta Government is acting under the relief indebtedness act passed at the last session of the Alberta Legislature. The act cancelled indebtedness of farmers in respect to old advances made by the Alberta Government from 1908 to 1922 for agricultural purposes.

Will Not Actively Engage In Election

 TORONTO, July 20—Premier Hepburn of Ontario will not take the platform "one way or the other" in the forthcoming Dominion election, he said today. "Everyone knows where I stand and what I think, but I am not going to make any election speeches at all," he added.

Mr. Hepburn reiterated his position that Liberal members of the Ontario Legislature may support Federal Liberal candidates if they choose.

Mr. Hepburn's statement today apparently ended speculation that he might carry his anti-socialism toward P. E. I. Minister Mackenzie King to the point of opposing the Federal Government openly in the next Dominion campaign.
