DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

House of Commons.

Debate on Redistribution Bill.

A Division on the Amendment—Government Majority 53.

OTTAWA, June 3.

In the House of Commons, yesterday, Mr. Davies resumed the debate on the redistribution bill. He regretted that Mr. O'Brien should have declined to support the amendment, which was a very proper one. Parliament could not delegate to Judges or any one else the work of redistribution until such a time as it defined the principles on which the redistribution took place. The amendment was, therefore, drawn on proper lines and in accordance with the British North America Act. He challenged the House to apply these principles themselves. The duty of the House was plain, that it should fix the lines and determine the principles and time when redistribution should come into effect. The application of these principles will be done by a commission or committee, and finally parliament was to make these legal. After the principles of redistribution were decided, the rest of the work was mechanical. The machinery to govern themselves in parliament was vital to the people of the country. Bad laws might be passed, but as long as the people had the machinery in their own hands they could not complain.

Sir John Thompson said that he was surprised to notice that nearly the whole discussion, so far, was confined to details of the bill. That was a matter which should be left to a committee of the whole house, and therefore he would not partake in that feature of the discussion. He repeated what he said when the bill was first introduced, that the bill was framed in accordance with the duty which the Government owed the House in connection with the taking of the census. Each decade a measure was designed with the view that there should be a general redistribution, on the principle of representation by population, or the application of the bill would have taken much wider scope and would have secured greater advantages for the party. Those districts only were interfered with where the general representation was on increased or decreased population was to be provided for. He pointed out that there was no precedent for such an amendment to the bill as a new departure in Parliamentary procedure. He then dealt with the constitutional point raised by Mr. Davies and showed that in 1872 and again in 1882, redistribution bills were passed and no such issue was ever raised. This system was pursued for a quarter of a century without any exception being taken to it. In his humble judgment the House of Commons had full control to deal with the subject.

After a further discussion, the House divided on the amendment which was lost, 53 to 110. It was a straight party vote.

Railway Men Discharged.

MONTREAL, June 3.

Notice has been given to twenty-six employees of the Intercolonial Railway shops here that their services are no longer required. This makes thirty-one discharged from the shops here and completes the list. Ten have been discharged at Campbellton and twenty-six at River du Loup.
