THE TREATIES DENOUNCED.

Change in the Commercial Policy of Great Britain.

Shall We Have Preferential Trade.

BERLIN, July 31.—The commercial treaty between Great Britain and the German Zollverein which has been in force since May 30, 1865, was denounced yesterday by Great Britain and will cease to be operative a year hence.

The Reich Sanzeigr says that supplementary conventions which were concluded when the treaty was extended to the German States joining the Zollverein will expire with the main treaty next summer.

It says that it has been believed here that the danger of Great Britain denouncing the commercial treaties with Germany and Belgium was past, and therefore the news that the treaties had been denounced caused all the greater sensation, though it is believed that official circles had full knowledge of matters and that King Leopold of Belgium, during his recent visit to Kiel exchanged views with the Emperor. The event lends great interest to the attitude of the government towards agrarians who will seize the chance to demand that the tariff war with England be waged as they have already demanded with regard to the United States.

LONDON, July 31.—The papers here comment on the denouncing of the treaties.

BRUSSELS, July 31.—Le Soir publishes a special edition in which it announces that the British Government has denounced the commercial treaty with Belgium.

THE UPRISING IN INDIA

Heavy Losses of the Enemy.

A DISHEARTENING INCIDENT.

LONDON, July 31.—A despatch to the Times from Simla says that the losses of the enemy in the fighting of Thursday night are believed to be greater than were reported. The fact that Mullah is wounded and his chief disciple killed will dishearten the fanatics.

LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL

LONDON, July 30.—In the house of lords yesterday the Marquis of Lansdowne, secretary of state for war, in reply to a question by Earl Carrington, said that the commissions of officers who had served under Dr. Jameson in the raid in the Transvaal, and of which these officers had been deprived, would not be restored.

LONDON July 29.—In the house of commons yesterday Mr. Chamberlain, the colonial secretary, in reply to a question as to whether the government could report progress as to the Pacific cable project, said that the ministers of the colonies decided further time to consider the matter.

BOMBAY, July 29.—Sirbar Balantrae Natu and Hropant Ramahunder Natu, who was arrested yesterday on a charge of disloyalty, and escorted outside the limits of the Ponna collectorate, have been deported, under the act empowering the viceroy to issue a warrant for the arrest and deportation, without trial, of persons known to be engaged in disloyal practices. The power of deportation has not been exercised for many years.

CINCINNATI, July 29.—After watching his gallant filly win in the Ohio stakes in the hardest kind of a drive, Dr. E. F. McLean, one of the best known horsemen on the American turf, was attacked with heart disease and died a short time afterwards at the Oakley race this afternoon. Mr. McLean was sitting alone in the timbers' stand when he dropped over grasping for breath. Medical aid was summoned, but despite the efforts of several physicians the turfman died just as the bugle sounded calling the horses to the post for the last race.

CONSTANTINOPLE, July 29.—The demand of the German ambassador, Baron Saurma De Jeltsch, that a provision be inserted in the peace treaty between Greece and Turkey for a European control of Greek finances meets with disfavor among the other ambassadors. They consider that it is not covered by their instructions, but should be made the subject of direct negotiations between Germany and the other powers. Even the Turks oppose this project, as they regard it as an attempt to take advantage of the peace negotiations in the interests of German bond holders.

While it is thought probable that Greece could raise the indemnity loan without such guarantees as would be provided by European control of her finances, the proposed stipulation is not regarded as in order in a treaty to which only Greece and Turkey are parties.

LONDON, July 30.—A despatch from Simla this morning says the Government is taking all steps necessary to cope with the emergency in the Ceaural. Although Fort Chakdara, now cut off, occupies an isolated position, it is believed that, with two companies of the 31st Punjab Infantry and two guns, the garrison can hold its own.

The road between Mardan and Malakland is blocked with hostile tribesmen, who have cut the telegraph wires. Three squadrons of Bengal Lancers and the Second Punjab Infantry have started for Mardan. The seventh mountain battery is on the way to Malakland, and the West Kent Regiment is held in readiness at Peshawa. The Simla despatch also says that Captain Ho land, of the 24th Punja Infantry, was among those wounded seriously during Monday night's attack on Camp Malakland.

MADRID, July 29.—A special from Oporto, Portugal, says the political situation, already grave, has been aggravated by the strong measures taken by the Government to intimidate the Republicans and to force them to give effect to its financial proposals. The ministerial organs warn the Republicans that they will be "rigorously dealt with." These newspapers declare "that Republicans cannot be permitted to provoke agitation and disturb the public mind." The Opposition newspapers vigorously condemn the Government policy of suppressing public meetings, and denounce it "as contrary to law." At Lisbon and other large towns the Government is taking special precautions owing to the reports that the Republicans intend to provoke disturbances. Troops are patrolling Lisbon, where reinforcements are arriving, and the local commandant has so stationed his staff as to meet all eventualities. Reports are current of the impending prosecution and dismissal from the army of a number of officers, among whom are several generals.

LIVERPOOL, July 30.—A band of anarchists who had been exiled from Spain arrived here yesterday on their way to London. Several of the members of the party were interviewed, and related their experience in Spanish prisons. They said they had been fed upon salt fish and had been deprived of water for eight days at a time. The prison authorities promised to give them water if they would make confessions. Owing to this treatment one of their number went mad and was shot down in his cell. Others were branded with hot irons and their nails pulled out and were tortured in other ways.

LONDON, July 29.—Right Hon. Joseph Chamberlain, secretary of state for the colonies, has received a despatch from Her Majesty's High Commissioner at the Cape stating that in the fighting at Fort Martin, near Hartley, South Africa, on Saturday, the noted chief Mashingombi was slain, and between four and five hundred of his followers were taken prisoners. The Government forces occupied all the positions at Marlie's Krall, where they captured more than 100 prisoners.

A despatch from Fort Salisbury says that the British forces took the natives completely by surprise. When a charge was made on the stockades the natives fled to their caves in which they were afterwards captured, Mashingombi's main cave being destroyed by dynamite. Mashingombi was wounded during the attack and died soon after being taken prisoner. Two bullets made of solid gold were found after the fight.
