"The whole atmosphere of Europe," says the London Times, "is now a series of cells surcharged with gas, which the most colorless word from one like Mr. Gambetta or Prince Bismarck is able to explode in a moment."

A CENSUS is to be taken for the first time in British India. The work will commence in February next, and the population of the feudatory states, as well as the English provinces, will be included. The work will be a vast one, and active preparations have already commenced.

THE British Columbia Government failed to issue a proclamation proroguing the Legislative Assembly at the close of the late session, and now it is argued that the Government, by their failure in this respect, have killed the Local House, and that should they refuse to order a general election all the legislation of the next session will be void.

We are glad to learn that our Island Exhibits, are being favorably commented upon at the Montreal Exhibition. The Horses arrived without a scratch, and are safely housed on the Exhibition grounds, where they have already been viewed by Senator Cochran, of Ontario, and other prominent stock raisers, who seemed much pleased with their appearance.

The Queen's County election on Thursday will be to vote for or against the petition to put the Canada Temperance Act in force. Temperance voters, therefore, vote for it at the polls.

ANOTHER fishery difficulty has taken place on Newfoundland Coast—this time at Conception Bay. On the 4th of August last, the schooner "Moro Castle," of Gloucester, Mass., anchored a mile off the shore, for the purpose of procuring bait. During the absence of the captain, the crew attempted to catch a few squid. The vessel was boarded by 300 natives, who drove the crew into the cabin and fore-castle, and got sail under way. The captain returned and found the islanders drifting on the rocks; they were frightened, left the vessel, and came near going ashore. The day previous, the schooner "Victor" was boarded in a similar manner and violence used to prevent her fishing. The Newfoundland Government's objection to Sunday fishing and the use of seines does not hold in this case, as the crew of the "Moro Castle" were line fishing and had only taken about a dozen squid.

This vessel was built for Peake Bros. & Co., and was towed down to their No. 2 Wharf, Charlottetown, by the steam tug "Henry Aitken."

THE CATTLE TRADE.—The N. Y. Tribune of Sept. 14 says:—The trade in live cattle between this country and Europe, began a few years ago as an experiment, has increased to a remarkable extent, and is superseding that in dressed meats. The shipments last season were 165,324 head, and thus far this year 118,000. The amount of the trade in money is from \$32,000,000 to \$35,000,000 a year for the entire trade of the country.
