TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

The English Elections.

LONDON, July 5. The issue at the polls is fast becoming more definite. The position of affairs to-night presages a crushing defeat for Gladstone, unless he can manage to obtain a much larger county vote than he did at the elections in November last.

BOSTON, July 6. Twenty-five thousand people witnessed the rowing regatta on the Charles River yesterday.

A New Dodge.

ARICHAH, C. B., July 6. THE American fishermen have discovered or invented a new dodge for obtaining bait. They come into port on some flimsy pretext; enter at the Custom House; make arrangements for surreptitiously getting a supply of bait, then take it "on the wing" as they sail out of the harbor the next morning.

Indignation of the Americans.

OTTAWA, July 6. A special despatch from Portland, Me., says that the most intense indignation prevails there over the recent seizure of the three schooners at Shelburne, N. S., but a Washington despatch, on the same subject, admits that the seizures are perfectly legal, and warns American fishermen to strictly observe and obey the Canadian customs laws.

An Opinion on England's Position.

LONDON, July 6. At a banquet of the Imperial Federation League, Lord Roseberry, referring to the duty of the Imperial Government to support Colonial interests, said that when the Blue Books respecting the fisheries question were read it would be found that the Government had upheld Colonial interests with firmness, strength and dignity.

A Derelict.

SHEET HARBOUR, N. S., July 6. THE Norwegian barque Vale, Capt. Alson, has arrived here and reports that, when twenty miles southeast of Beaver Island Light, she passed a wrecked vessel turned bottom up and estimated to be of about five hundred tons. No name could be seen, nor any means found of identifying her.

Penalties for Customs Violations.

SHELBURNE, N. S., July 6. Collector Atwoods has imposed a fine of four hundred dollars and expenses upon each of the three recently seized fishing schooners City Point, G. W. Cushing and C. B. Harrington.

To be Perpetuated.

LONDON, July 6. It has been finally decided to perpetuate the Colonial and Indian Exhibition in permanent form, and it will accordingly be established probably on the Thames embankment.

MONTREAL, July 6. A despatch from Vancouver, B. C., says that the first through train of the Canada Pacific Railway, which left here on Monday last, reached Vancouver at noon on Sunday, sharp on time.

OTTAWA, July 6. Minister of Marine and Fisheries Foster has left for New Brunswick, and Minister of Interior White for British Columbia.
