Instead of trying to make dozens of Christmas cookies at one time, you might start this week with the Two-Way Oatmeal Raisin Cookies in today's column. For a special Christmas touch, ice all the cookies and center the icing with half a candied cherry; then on each air-perkily place 2 green leaves cut from thin sliced citron. Cool until the icing is firm. If the cookies are to be packaged for gifting or mailing, strew the cookies before the icing sets with tiny colored candies instead of using the cherries.

1 c. sifted flour  
1/2 tsp. salt  
1/2 tsp. baking soda  
1/2 tsp. ground cinnamon  
1/2 tsp. ground nutmeg

1/2 c. firm-packed brown sugar  
1/2 c. granulated sugar  
1 egg  
1 tsp. vanilla  
1 tsp. milk  
1 c. rolled oats (quick or 1 c. raisins

## Federal Government Wins Major Supreme Court Case

OTTAWA (CP)—The federal government won a major case Tuesday when the Supreme Court of Canada upheld the validity of broadcasting licence fees totalling millions of dollars. In a 4-to-1 decision, the court ruled that federal licence fees levied since 1960 on Canada's privately-owned television and radio stations are valid and constitutional. The highest court threw out a Nov. 12, 1963, judgment by the Exchequer Court of Canada that found the fees invalid.

## N.Y. Exchange Honors Woman Stock Analyst

NEW YORK (CP)—A Canadian has become the 50th woman with a vote in the operation of the New York Stock Exchange. Sheila Baird of Toronto is a 29-year-old analyst who came to New York in August, 1965, and later joined the new firm of M. Kimelman and Co., which became a member of the exchange early in November. There now are 5,181 partners or voting stockholders in member firms on Wall Street and, since women still represent less than one per cent of the total the Big Board thought enough of Miss Baird's appointment to announce it. A University of Toronto graduate, Miss Baird began her career as an analyst with Manufacturers Life Insurance in Toronto. She took a year off to work for a brokerage firm in London, then returned to Manufacturers. She came to New York last year to work as an analyst for Anderson and Co. "I decided I like the brokerage business and I decided I liked New York." When Michael Kimelman set up his own firm, Miss Baird became one of three active partners, responsible for analyzing securities.

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## New Cyclists Face Ban On Ont. Roads

TORONTO (CP)—The Ontario government has taken steps to keep beginner motorcycle drivers off Ontario highways and put the brakes on a rising accident and death toll for these vehicles. Starting Jan. 1 anyone applying for a licence to ride a motorcycle will be required to pass an examination in its operations. Transport Minister Irwin Haskett has announced. At present anyone holding a motor vehicle driver's licence can operate a motorcycle. All 90-day instruction permits for the operation of motorcycles will be abolished. Beginners are to be banned from public roads in learning to operate the vehicles. An applicant wishing to operate other motor vehicles in addition to motorcycles must pass a separate examination and will then receive a licence endorsed for both. Mr. Haskett said. Persons who now operate motorcycles on drivers' licences will be able to convert their licences to include the motorcycle endorsement, provided they can prove they are experienced drivers. Mr. Haskett said Ontario is working with the other Canadian provinces in an attempt to obtain a standard drivers' test. Until such an agreement is obtained, Ontario will continue to recognize motorcycle licenses issued by other provinces.

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
