

One Less Seat Is Planned In Quebec Redistribution

MONTREAL (CP)—A sweeping reorganization of the boundaries of federal constituencies in Quebec, which would reduce the province's Commons representation to 74 from 75, has been recommended.

The recommendation was made in a report by the Electoral Boundaries Commission for Quebec. It aims to bring constituencies into line with a uniform standard of population.

The commission would cause 42 constituencies under their present names to disappear via mergers with other districts; create 11 new constituencies and leave only one Quebec constituency unaltered.

It also wants fewer municipalities to be split for purposes of federal elections, and seeks to correct what some commission officials called "a slight imbalance favoring sparsely populated districts" in Quebec's representation at Ottawa.

CAOUCETTE AFFECTED

Among the MPs whose constituencies would be merged are Creditiste Leader Real Caouette, now the member for Villeneuve in northwestern Quebec, Forestry Minister Maurice Sauve in Les-de-la-Madeline, a Gulf of St. Lawrence area, and Liberal John Turner of Montreal St. Lawrence-St. George.

The single untouched riding would be Verdun, a Montreal-area seat currently held by a Liberal.

Quebec had a total population of 2,592,241 at the 1961 census, on which the commission based its calculations.

For Quebec, the commission's chairman is Mr. Justice Paul Langlois of Superior Court.

Other members are C. L. O'Brien, Glass, principal and vice-chancellor of Bishop's University in Lennoxville, Que.; Francois Drouin, Quebec's chief electoral officer; and Nelson Castonguay, acting federal chief electoral officer who is an ex-officio member of the redistribution commissions for each of the 10 provinces.

The present constitution boundaries were established by the Commons in 1952.

The commissions were set up by federal law last year "to report upon the readjustment of the representation of the provinces in the House of Commons and to provide for the readjustment of such representation in accordance therewith."

NO MAJOR SHIFT

Quebec's rural areas under the new plan would not find themselves reduced in representation to any considerable extent. There is no major shift in constituencies, only big changes in boundaries, one of which is the merger of the islands of Montreal and the Jesus together would have 24 members, three more than the current number.

Quebec City would be divided into three constituencies—Limoulin, Langelier and Louis-Hebert, which would not extend beyond the city limits.

However, there is a reasonable chance that West, in view of his overall, has the king of diamonds, in which event one loser can be cut off. On top of that, there is a further possibility of also being able to cash dummy's fourth diamond, in which case another loser will disappear.

This latter possibility is, however, complicated by the block situation in diamonds. Thus, suppose declarer draws trumps right away and leads the queen of diamonds. Whether West plays the king on this trick or the next, South finds it impossible to utilize dummy's fourth diamond and he goes down one.

This complication, easy enough to anticipate if West is granted the king of diamonds, should cash only the Q-J of clubs and start him on a path of thinking that will lead him to a solution of the problem.

The answer is that South should cash only the Q-J of spades and then lead the Queen of diamonds, leaving the trump at large. It does not matter whether or not West covers, in either case, South cashes three rounds of diamonds.

When it turns out that West does not have the missing trump, South makes the contract, since he can enter dummy with his trump and discard one of his losers on the nine of diamonds.

It is true that declarer runs the risk of having the second or third diamond lead ruffed, but, since making the contract is his prime consideration, he must play on the basis that the winning distribution exists.

Opening lead—king of clubs. It is a basic principle of dummy play that, if a contract can be made only if the opponents' cards are divided in a certain way, declarer plays for that distribution to exist.

Here is a typical case. West leads the king of clubs, which declarer wins with the ace. The situation is far from promising, since there is a possibility of losing three hearts, a club and a diamond.

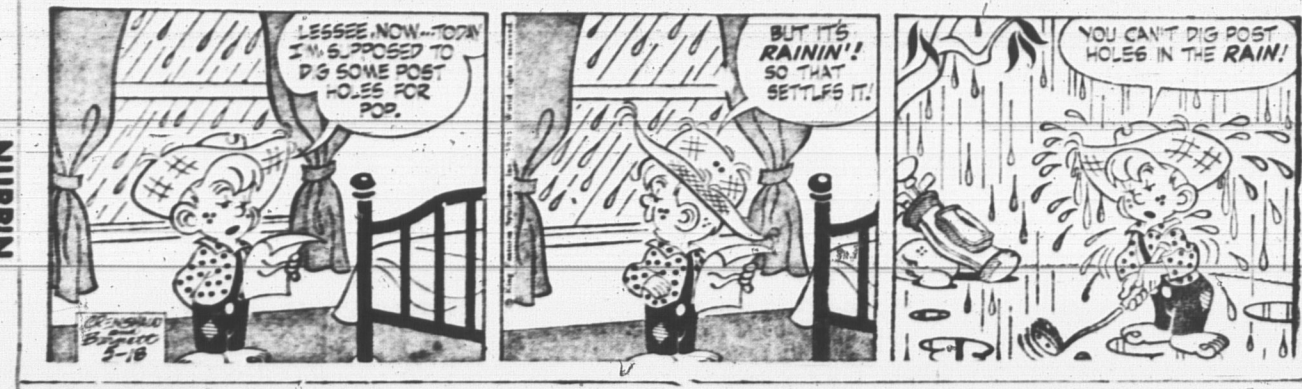
