Summerside may not have a covered rink, but just now the town is one vast open-air skating palace. Both motorists and pedestrians have been experiencing all the thrills of a tight-rope walker in a circus. This one may be the same, but there is a chance that the question whether to discuss proposed legislation in an open meeting, or in a closed caucus may achieve considerable prominence before the voters go to the polls.

The election card of the new candidate contesting the east ward stated that the candidate favored discussing as many questions as possible in the open Council Chamber, and if the retiring council members stoutly defend the present method of operating, it could be that the voters will give this controversy as much, or more consideration than they do to the ability and personality of the candidates themselves.

Election issues can be comparatively unimportant or they can be so important that they dwarf the candidates supporting them. The

stronger and more vital the issues, the less significant is the identity of the candidates who uphold these issues. A really strong platform can sweep a pygmy into power over a political giant, and as the issues dwindle in significance, the stature of the standard-bearer shoots up and his mental and moral worth are the things for the voters to ponder over.
