NEWFOUNDLAND THRILLED BY ROYAL VISIT

FRENCH SUB IS LOCATED

Sabotage Rumor Raised In Loss Of Phenix.

PARIS, June 18 (AP)—French naval officers said tonight they had established that the submarine Phenix with a reported 71 men aboard had sunk approximately eight miles northeast of Cam Ranh Bay.

Only trace of the submarine was a circle of oil which claimed a spot on the rough surface of the bay.

The location of the disaster, these officials declared, was shown on naval maps to be in water between 85 and 375 feet deep.

The maps also showed, they said, that in that part of the Chinese Sea the ocean's bed is flat without rocky ledges which might have fouled and wrecked the Phenix.

Authorities said—two cruisers, three auxiliary boats and two other vessels were continuing their search in an attempt to find the Phenix.

Only her sister submarine, L'Esper (Hope), had turned back to Saigon.

WILL CONSIDER ACTION TODAY IN FAR EAST

British Cabinet To Discuss Reprisals Against Japan For Blockade

LONDON, June 18—The Foreign Affairs Committee of the Cabinet will meet tomorrow to consider reprisals against Japan unless there is an unexpected change in the Far Eastern situation.

Key ministers remained in London over the week end, hoping that Japan would indicate a willingness to compromise the dispute which resulted in the blockade of the British and French Concessions in Tientsin last night.

The United States and France continued in close communication with Britain. It was said in official circles, however, that the question of joint action had not been discussed. They said Britain was going ahead with her plans independently.

COLONISTS ARE ENTHUSIASTIC IN WELCOME

New Page Is Written In Age-Old Saga Of Island History

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., June 18 (CP Cable)—A bright new page in the age-old saga of Newfoundland went down in the history books tonight after the people of this most ancient of British colonies had extended a welcome and a farewell to the first British Monarch to visit its rugged shores.

King George and his smiling Consort, Elizabeth, were far at sea as they headed toward the homeland, but the memory of their visit still left a thrill running through this colony that Sir Humphrey Gilbert founded in 1583. Never in its centuries had Newfoundland gone through such a day as Royalty gave it yesterday.

Honors Naval Officers

Again, as they were on the way out to their "Royal Yacht," the King visited three warships off Portugal Cove, and conferred honors on four officers of his navy. Vice-Admiral Sidney Meyrick received, in his own cabin, the honor of knighthood. The King touched him on the shoulder with a sword and he became Sir Sidney.
