PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND BAPTISTS.

Out in the Gulf of St. Lawrence, as if anchored, lies the little Island of Prince Edward. Its inhabitants proudly call it the "Gem of the Gulf," nor would one dispute so apt a description of so truly lovely a spot.

The first planting of the Baptist churches on the Island is one of the most interesting features of its history. At the present time the Baptist Association of Prince Edward Island has twenty-six stations, served by fifteen ministers.

Rev. Charles Tupper, father of the present eminent baronet of the same name, leader of the Conservative Party in the Canadian Parliament, and recently High Commissioner of Canada to Great Britain, appears to have been the chief instrument of planting the Baptist Church on the Island.

In 1845 the late Dr. Rand, famous as a scholar, and a matchless linguist, was appointed on a mission to Charlottetown (the capital), and in August of that year the first Baptist church was opened in the city.

As a representative of the Baptists on Prince Edward Island, and a type of a true man, Samuel MacLeod, late of Ugg, is a prominent figure. He was born in the Isle of Skye, Scotland, whence he emigrated to the Island in 1829.
