

Smokies In Lopsided Win; Crush E. Germany 11-5

STOCKHOLM (CP) — Trail Smokies' pace of play in their three-goal performance of forward Addy Tambellini, defeated East Germany 11-5 Saturday for their second straight victory in the world hockey tournament.

The mild-mannered contest held some anxious moments for the Canadians in the state when they were badly disorganized. The East Germans ran up a 4-0 margin after less than five minutes and led 4-3 at the end of the first period.

"Our defence was very, very loose at the start," said Canadian coach Bobby Kromm. "I was pretty worried, but it is a sign of a good team when it can come back like we did."

Sweden upset Russia 2-1 Friday night with a second period goal after the Soviet scored in the initial session.

Only two penalties were called in Saturday's East German match, both going to the Canadians in the third period. Canada now has only two Smokies goals, one of them in the third period against West Germany Friday in a 6-0 Canadian win.

SCORES ON REBOUND
Tambellini completed the period scoring with the first of his three goals, picking up a rebound and flicking it in.

McIntyre evened the count at 4-4 at 1:22 of the middle session but Helmut Novy put the East Germans ahead a little more than a minute later on a rink-long dash.

Tambellini, rushing in with Forhan, took a pass from Forhan and scored with a bullet-like shot from about 15 feet at 5:32.

A surprise goal came at 14:33 when Ferguson, about 30 feet in front of the East German net, took a long pass from Harold Jones and golfed it into the upper right hand corner.

GOALIE FORCED OUT
Goalie Hirscho, who made 14 saves in the first period, had to quit the game in the second when he suffered cramps. He was replaced by Peter Kolbe.

In all, the two goalies made 44 saves while Seth Martin, veteran of the 1961 champion Trail club had 22.

Kromm said he thought the East Germans played a far superior game against Sweden Thursday, when the Swedes scored a 5-1 victory, than they did against Canada Saturday.

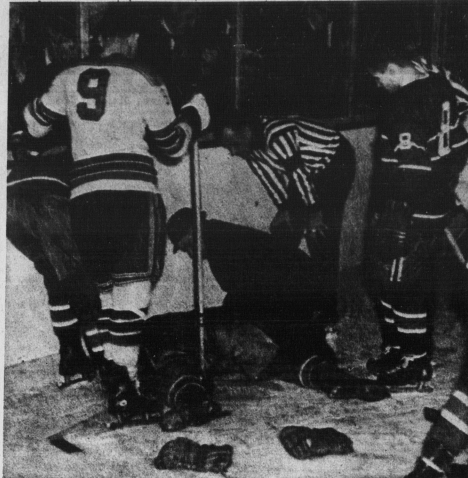

Canadiens Avenge Loss; Trounce New York 5-1

NEW YORK (AP)—Montreal Canadiens, missing four veteran players, stayed in the running for a sixth straight National Hockey League title with a 5-1 victory over New York Rangers Sunday night.

The Canadiens, who had bowed to the Rangers 5-2 in Montreal Saturday night, bounced back with a game they had to win or else lose ground to Toronto and Chicago in the tight battle for first place in the league race.

Montreal played without defencemen Tom Johnson and Lou Fontinato and centre Phil Goyette—all sidelined with injuries.

Besides that, winger Bernie Geoffroy was sitting out the third game of a five-game suspension.

The Canadiens, looking sharp and checking hard, scored two goals in each of the first two periods.

SPILLS SHUTOUT
New York's Camille Henry of New York spoiled goalie Jacques Plante's bid for a sixth shutout with his first goal midway in the second period.

Ralph Backstrom and Jean Beliveau gave the Canadiens a 2-0 lead in the opening period. Montreal built the margin to 4-0 in the second period with Gilles Tremblay and Billy Hicke clicking for goals.

The third period was enlivened by a fight between Vic Hadfield of the Rangers and Bobby Rousseau of the Canadiens after Rousseau and New

York goalie Gump Worsley raised their sticks in a goal-mouth melee. Hadfield and Rousseau were given majors by referee Art Sliv.
