### British Airline Pilot Describes Attack In Which 10 Persons Died

The three terrible minutes in which his four-engined DC-4 Sky-master was shot down into the sea by two fighters off the Communist island of Hainan on Friday with loss of 10 lives are described here by Capt. Philip Blown.

**HONG KONG (Reuters)**—The attack took place 10 miles east of the normal international air corridor east of Hainan island, about 11:45 Friday morning.

I am pretty darn sure they came from the Chinese Communist air-base at Sanya on the island. I can't say definitely whether or not they were Communist planes, but they certainly were not American or British-made. They looked a little like Japanese wartime Zeros. They were propeller-driven and certainly not MiGs.

Our Sky-master was seven minutes behind time on its flight plan when I altered course to give the Communist island a wide berth. I had been heading for Hong Kong for eight minutes when, by sheer chance, my co-pilot, Cedric Carlton, saw a fighter on the starboard side about 300 feet higher than the Sky-master and about 150 yards astern.

I looked out on the port side and saw another fighter in the identical spot on my side. They were small, cream-colored single seaters with clipped-off wings and sharp red noses.

**GAVE NO WARNING**  
They started firing without warning. Both registered hits. The first sign was fire in my No. 1 port engine.

I began evasive action, zig-zagging all the way down from 9,000 feet, where the attack began, to 5,000 feet, when I noticed that my rudder controls were shot away.

Logically, I should not be here. I think the luggage behind us saved Carlton and me.

With the plane in a high-speed stall I yelled to the crew that I was ditching. They braced themselves against a bulkhead.

The impact broke the left window and tore out the starboard sliding window of the cockpit. It filled with water.

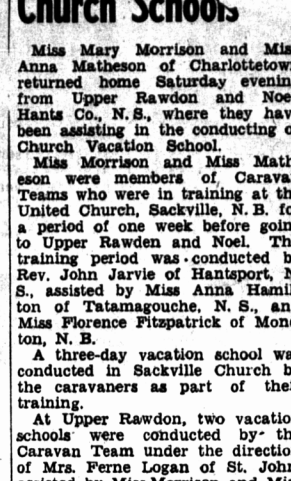
When we were in the water the two fighters made one turn around the wreckage and headed in the direction of Sanya.

I think about half those who did not survive must have been killed by gunfire and the rest drowned.

**SPOT RUBBER DINGHY**  
We must have been swimming for an hour when Carlton recognized that the object in a box a woman passenger was using to help her keep afloat was a 20-man rubber dinghy.

Carlton got it inflated, clambered aboard and pulled up each of the survivors while I pushed them up from the water.

### Awakes To Save Kids From Fire

**OTTAWA (CP)**—An Ottawa father awakened just in time Saturday night to save the lives of his four children when a fire broke out in his second-floor apartment.

Arthur S. Conway said he awakened around midnight to see clouds of smoke billowing down the hall from his living room and the dance of flame reflections on the walls. He removed Bobby, 6, and Arthur Jr., 4, and then went back for the two younger children, Donald, 3, and Dianne, four months.

Meantime, Mrs. Conway made her way to safety.

Firemen fought more than an hour to bring the blaze under control.

### Police Fail To Locate Girl Who Escaped Jail

**MONTREAL (CP)**—Police said Sunday night they have failed so far to track down glamorous Gertrude Servant, 23-year-old redhead, who escaped from the city's Pullum St. women's jail six days ago with another prisoner, 204-pound Georgette Tremblay.

They said all leads to the whereabouts of Miss Servant, who escaped while waiting trial on charge of taking part in the 1953 bludgeoning of local restaurant owner Bert J. McAbbie, have "pettered out".

Detective Lieutenant Marcel Patenaude said he is convinced a cab-driver who drove the women away from the jail after the break was not involved in their getaway.

Miss Servant was being held with three other men, including her brother, Leo, on robbery and murdered charges in connection with the slaying.

A fifth suspect, Gerald Patrick McKuhen, deported Friday from the United States, was scheduled to arrive in Montreal Sunday night with three detectives who picked him up from American authorities at Windsor, Ont.
