

The Millionaires of the Day. MEN WHO HAVE SECURED FORTUNES WITHIN THE HALF CENTURY.

(New York Star.) "You may talk about the coming billionaire as you please," observed a Wall Street magnate, to the representative of the Star, "but how much solid wealth, do you imagine, would be represented by a pyramid which would include, from base to apex, such men as Vanderbilt, Gould, Keene, Sage, Huntington, Field, Dillon, and Hatch? A startling amount you say? Well, let a crash come, some suffer, others are completely annihilated, and the total outcome is—your billionaire. It only requires a crisis to produce him, that is all. Vanderbilt, alone is worth, in securities and other property, at least, \$200,000,000. "And how about Jay Gould?" "Oh, well, put him down for \$150,000,000." The figures may seem a little too high, but I have no doubt Gould stands next in the list after Vanderbilt. The Astors are worth \$100,000,000. Their riches came by inheritance, and the natural increase in the value of property. After such great money kings as Gould, Vanderbilt, and the Astors, the other rich men of the city seem comparatively insignificant. Russell Sage's \$15,000,000 is a small pile beside Gould's \$150,000,000. Whitelaw Reid's rather-in-law, Mills, is said to be worth \$15,000,000. "How much is Dillon worth?" "From \$9,000,000 to \$12,000,000. "And Cyrus W. Field?" "I have no doubt that Field could count his pile at \$10,000,000. In my opinion Keene is more famous than wealthy. I estimate his wealth as between \$2,500,000 and \$3,500,000. Huntington, the railroad man, is worth anywhere from \$4,000,000 to 6,000,000." Speaking of the late Augustus Schell, the Wall Street man observed: "The published statement of the amount of property bequeathed by Mr. Schell, fixed the amount of his property at over \$15,000,000. The figures may be somewhat too high, and they may be too low, but I am satisfied that they cannot be more than \$2,000,000 or \$3,000,000 out of the way. Mr. Schell came honestly into possession of every dollar of his property, and that is more than can be said of many of the rich men of the country. He was one of the most scrupulous and rigidly conscientious gentlemen I have ever met. Possessed of genuine abilities and a special aptitude for business, his wonderful success in life was not surprising. When Buchanan was elected, he appointed Mr. Schell collector of New York. From that eventful period (twenty-seven years ago) may be dated the beginning of Mr. Schell's financial prosperity. His wealth began to accumulate. When he entered the office of collector he was probably worth about \$10,000 or less. The prominent public position and influence which the collectorship carried with it, and the business reputation and knowledge of public affairs to which he speedily attained, afforded the opportunities, and besides, the era of railroads was beginning just then. About that time a number of new roads were projected, while others were building, and the field of legitimate investment was unrivaled. The first great railroad was completed about 1853. Others were progressing, and capital was in great demand. Thus Mr. Schell, almost at the outset of his investments, had all the advantages attending these great works, and had no obstacle to the accumulation of a large fortune. Indeed, I might say, that the same observation applies to a majority of our present millionaires. Nearly all the vast wealth they possess—hundreds of millions of dollars, and far beyond the wildest dreams of European nations, has been harvested within the last twenty-seven years by the exercise of a high order of business tact, sagacity and foresight in making investments. Gould, too, has made his pile, all of it within twenty years, Huntington, during the same period; Vanderbilt, certainly within a quarter of a century; Russell Sage and W. B. Ogden also; in fact you might take the last quarter from 1850 up and it would not be inappropriate to call it the golden age of investment. We shall probably never see such opportunities again.
