## Jury Exonerates Montague Driver

MONTAGUE — Driver Thomas Victor Dunn of Montague was exonerated of all blame in the August 1st death of seven-year-old Carol Anne Johnston of Peter's Road, by a coroner's jury which met in Montague Tuesday evening. She was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. MacDonald Johnston.

Following the completion of evidence, the seven man jury, deliberated 15 minutes and came up with the verdict that "Carol Anne Johnston of Peter's Road came to her death at Montague Hospital on August 1st, 1958, at approximately 10 p.m. as a result of internal injuries received after she was struck by a 1951 blue Ford car, driven by Thomas Victor Dunn of Montague. We place no blame on Mr. Dunn."

The inquest, held in the Legion Hall, was presided over by coroner, Dr. L.E. Prowse.

A total of eight witnesses were heard including: Dr. G.S.A. Inman, Montague, who treated the child for internal injuries on her arrival at the hospital; Garth Waldo Kerr, Montague, who witnessed the accident and picked up the small girl in his arms and took her to hospital; Sharon Joyce MacKinnon, Brooklyn, P.E.I., who was with the deceased prior to the accident; Const. D. J. Hender, member of the Montague detachment of the RCMP, who took measurements and photographs of the accident scene.

Other witnesses were Const. R. H. Lawford, another member of Montague detachment of the RCMP, who heard the squeal of brakes while in his office and rushed out and found the little girl lying in the street; Kenneth MacPhee, Montague mechanic, who examined the Dunn vehicle and found it to be in good mechanical working order.

Mrs. Dunn, Montague, who was a passenger in the vehicle driven by her husband, said she saw the girl run out into the street and strike the side of the car; Mr. Dunn, driver of the vehicle, said he was travelling about 15 miles per hour but that he could not avoid striking the child.

The members of the jury were: Douglas MacLaren, foreman, Fulton Campbell, Frank Green, George Brooks, Douglas McGowan, Claude Nicholson, and George MacPherson.

## Hessian, Saville Nominated By Fifth Kings Liberals

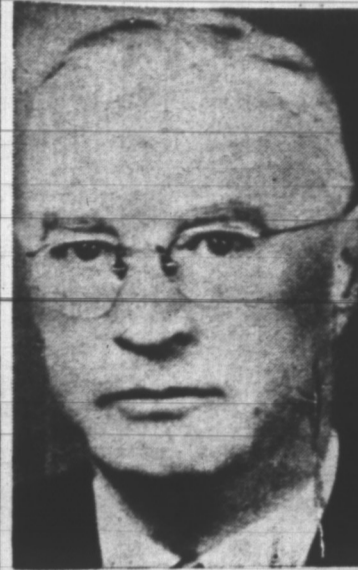

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### Liquor Store Break Solved

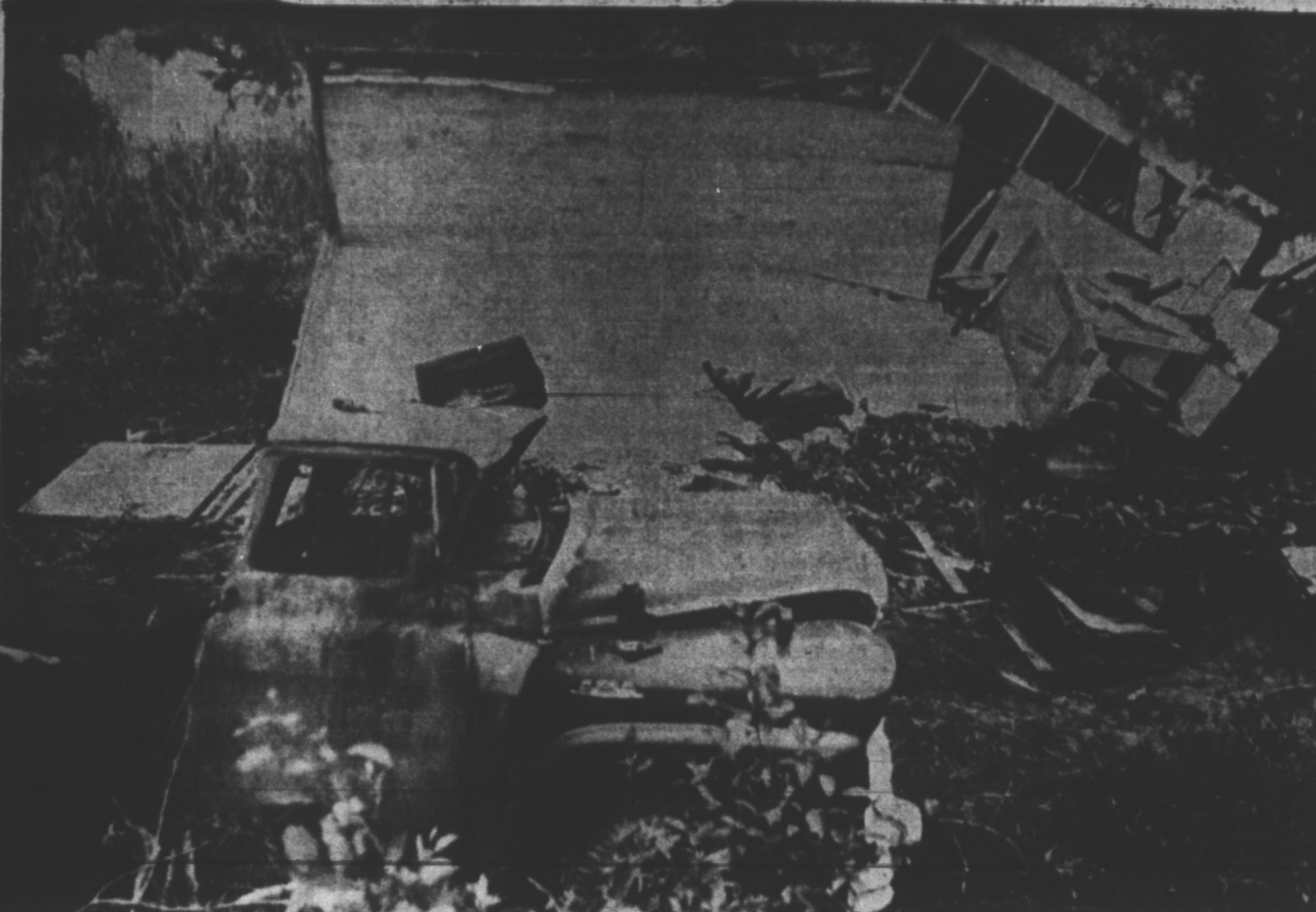

## Montague To Appoint Full Time Constable

MONTAGUE — At the regular meeting of the Montague Town

Council, Monday night, considerable discussion took place regarding police services. Councillor Charles Fraser, chairman of the police committee reported looking carefully into this matter during the past month. He commended Police Officer White for his efficient work on a part-time basis.

He also reported conferring with most merchants and found they favoured an improved police service. After thorough discussion it was decided to advertise for a full time police officer and for one additional part-time officer.

The tank for a new fire truck has arrived, it was reported, and this will be installed shortly. This addition will make this an extremely effective unit, particularly in small fires when an ample water supply is not always readily available.

The street committee reported that Riverside Drive and Brook Street had been paved and that MacLeod Avenue was now ready for pavement. The committee stated it hoped the contractor could return soon and complete this year's paving program. It was decided to pave the street from Main Street to Fraser Street by Llewellyn's store and to complete the paving of Riverside Drive. It was pointed out that the section of street at the west end had been overlooked through a misunderstanding.

A request received from some of the residents of MacDonald Avenue to place a sign reading "No through truck traffic", was granted.

Reports were received on the location of two signs that obstruct the view of motorists and the street committee were ordered to have these signs relocated. Also reported was a loose light on the bridge and this matter is to be referred to the department of highways.

A list of delinquent taxpayers was reviewed and the clerk was instructed to have this list published as soon as possible, following which court action will be taken to collect these arrears. Several routine matters were dealt with, following which the meeting adjourned.

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## Alberton Men Are Fined \$150 For Having 'Short' Lobsters

SUMMERSIDE — Stephen MacNeill and Lloyd MacNeill of Alberton were each fined \$150 in Magistrate's Court at Summerside yesterday when convicted of possession of undersized lobsters.

Daniel MacLean, also of Alberton, who previously pleaded not guilty to a similar charge, changed his plea to "guilty" at the conclusion of evidence for

the prosecution, and was fined \$25 and costs.

The fisheries department withdrew a charge that had been laid against his wife, Jeanetta MacLean, in connection with a similar case.

Magistrate R.S. Hinton presided at the court, and the four persons named above were represented by J. Watson MacNaught, Q.C.

## Body Discovered Off North Cape

No identification has been made as yet on a body of a man found in Island waters Tuesday morning.

The body was found by a Tignish fisherman, Stephen McInnis, approximately three or four miles northwest of North Cape, P.E.I. Mr. McInnis notified a fishery department boat, who picked up the body, which was in a bad state of decomposition, and brought it to Tignish Bay.

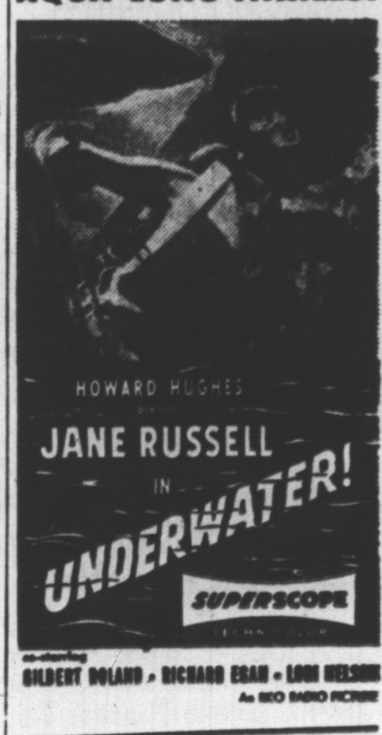
The remains are now resting at Rooney Funeral Home in Alberton. RCMP are still carrying out an investigation as to the identity of the dead man.

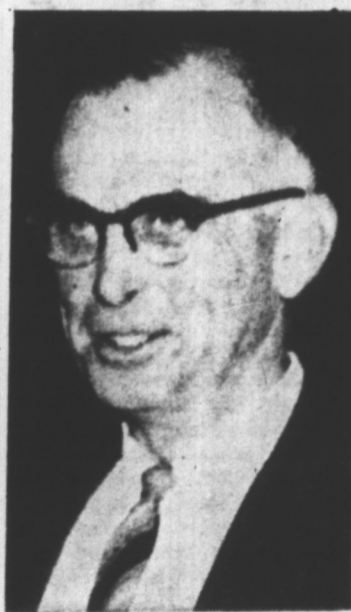

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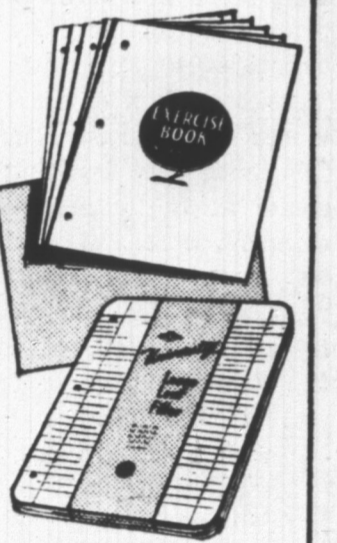
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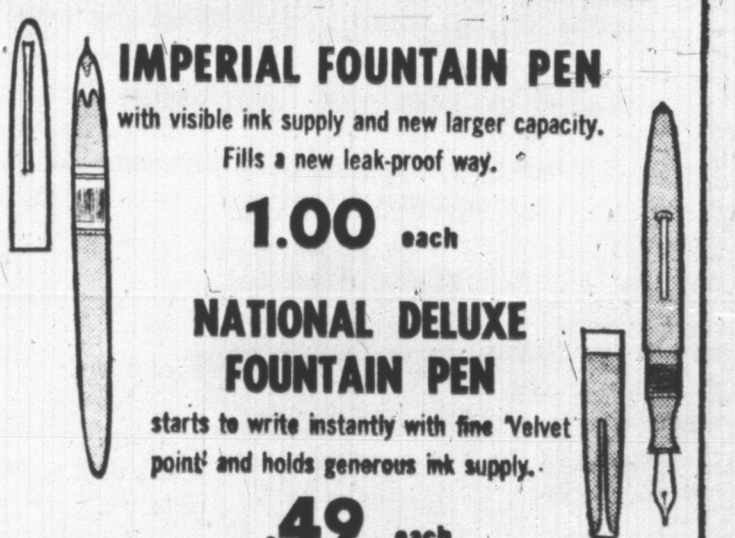
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
