Elected president was Tom Davies, vice-president is Ronald Greenan and Stanley Thompson, Southport is the secretary. Walter Burhoe is the treasurer.

The new organization is affiliated with the Maritime Retail Gasoline Association and has as one of its major objects the improvement of conditions for service station operators.

Hours of business so as to assure adequate service to the motoring public, the use of "marked" gasoline and a shrinkage allowance are some of the problems the association will endeavour to solve. A spokesman for the new association has declared.

Evangelistic Services Begin At First Baptist On Nov. 11th

Mr. Bailey served overseas during the Second World War with the Canadian Chaplaincy Corps. Two of these years being spent in the front lines with the Royal Edmonton Regiment. Mr. Bailey is still a major in the Chaplaincy Corps attached to the 37th Field Regiment, R.C.A.

Mr. Bailey does not come as a stranger to Charlottetown. Two years ago he was associated with the Rev. H. L. Mitton in conducting evangelistic services and it will be remembered that considerable numbers of people gathered to hear him. The congregations grew to the point where the former Baptist Church could not contain them. Through the kindness of the minister and session of Zion Presbyterian held in Zion. It is certain that he will be greeted by many who appreciated his ministry before.

Mr. Bailey was born in Pontypool, Wales, and came to Canada in 1928. He was educated at Brandon College, McMaster University and Yale University. He is a frequent broadcaster on the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation on both religious and secular programs. He was selected by "Saturday Night" as one of Canada's outstanding preachers. A year or so ago he was Lenten speaker for a week of services at Christ Church Cathedral in Montreal.

The services will continue from Wednesday evening, Nov. 11th, to Friday evening, Nov. 20th, each week night service beginning at 7.30.

During his stay in Charlottetown, Mr. Bailey will address the meeting of the Prince Edward Island Ministerial Association, Monday, Nov. 16th, and will be associated with Mr. Mitton on the morning devotional broadcasts Monday through Friday, Nov. 16th to 20th.

Borden Man Is Remanded

Following the taking of evidence a resident of Borden, charged with being drunk and disorderly, was remanded without bail until Monday, when he appeared before Magistrate K.M. Martin, Q.C., in City Police Court Saturday morning.

The charge arose following an incident reported to have taken place shortly after midnight Friday in Men's Restaurant, Queen Street, in which the accused is alleged to have grabbed the proprietor, Menton Whitlock, by the throat and tore his shirt.

The magistrate was apparently not pleased with the frequent long line-ups which have appeared on the docket during the past several days. In reference to them he remarked, "I'm getting pretty fed up with this accumulation every morning."

Pleading guilty Thursday morning to the charge of driving while his abilities were impaired by alcohol, Ivan E. Bernard, a resident of Belvedere Heights, was given a fine of \$100 and costs or 20 days in jail.

Two young men, one from Winsloe and the other from North River, both pleaded guilty to charges of creating a disturbance in a public place, the Rollaway dance hall. After hearing the circumstances the magistrate remanded both of the accused until Monday.
