Five French Groups Call For Bilingual Education In Ont.

OTTAWA (CP)—Five Ontario French-Canadian organizations have called for introduction of a bilingual system of education in the province from kindergarten to university. The groups presented the first brief to the committee on aims and objectives of education in the schools of Ontario, which began a two-day hearing in Ottawa.

The 21-member committee will hold hearings in London, Toronto and Sudbury in January.

The brief from the French-Canadian groups said it is essential that a bilingual official be appointed "to co-ordinate and integrate the proper functioning of a bilingual system from kindergarten to university."

The brief was drawn up by L'Association Canadienne-Française d'Éducation d'Ontario, L'Association des Enseignants Franco-Ontariens, L'Association des Commissions des Écoles Bilingues d'Ontario, La Fédération des Associations de Parents et d'Instituteurs de Langue Française d'Ontario and L'Association Franco-Ontarienne des Inspecteurs de l'Enseignement Bilingue et des Professeurs à l'École Normale.

levels of the system" and a "fair representation" among area superintendents of "competent bilingual men."

The inconsistency in not applying the same guiding principles at the secondary level as obtained for elementary bilingual schools must disappear. This situation was a "most questionable paradox."

The brief called for acceptance of the principle that "it would be feasible to set up a system within which it would be possible for a French-speaking child in Ontario to complete his education from kindergarten through secondary schools and on to university, so that he might enjoy the same benefits as those available to children of the minority group in the province of Quebec."

Textbooks written in French should be available to all French-speaking pupils at all levels. The program of studies should be revised by "qualified French-speaking educators with a view to adapting it to the particular needs of French-speaking children."

some 500,000 French-speaking residents of Ontario. Mr. Justice E. M. Hall, committee chairman, said about 10 per cent of Ontario's population is French-speaking.

On another point the groups said "we believe that every child, through his parents, has the inalienable right to grow in the faith of his choosing."

"The state must decide whether it is ready to protect the rights of the Roman Catholic and the French-speaking minority to ensure that young Franco-Ontarians shall enjoy educational advantages which will enable them to pursue their education from kindergarten to university and find a place in society where they can still identify themselves with their own religious and cultural group."

The groups said it can only be termed "unnatural, unjust, unfair and wilful discrimination" for the government not to approve bilingual elementary and secondary schools.

Toronto Stock Exchange Volume Is Down This Year

TORONTO (CP)—This year hasn't been a particularly busy one for the Toronto Stock Exchange—trading volume is down 301,419,567 shares compared with last year—and bonuses were expected to be small.

New York-based brokerage houses paid the biggest bonuses with Merrill, Lynch, Pierce, Fenner and Smith, Inc. giving as much as 17 weeks salary to employees with more than 13 years service. Employees with between two and eight years service received 12 weeks pay. The company paid a similar amount into its retirement program.

Baker, Weeks and Co., which does the main part of its business in the United States, paid five weeks salary to employees with up to 10 years service and six weeks to those with more than 10 years on staff. It also paid a similar amount into the retirement fund.

The Baker, Weeks gift was up one week from last year, while the Merrill, Lynch payment was up one-third.

Tremendous activity on the New York Stock Exchange this year opened the way to the gifts.

Waite, Reid and Co. Ltd., a Toronto-based company, was reported to have paid 16 weeks to its employees as a Christmas gift.

Albert Reid, a partner in the firm, said: "We paid a substan-

that bonus, but 16 weeks just isn't right."

The company, he said, had done a large business on the Vancouver Stock Exchange during the recent boom in companies with properties in the Pine Point area. Last year most of the business was done in stocks in the Timmins area of northern Ontario following the \$2,000,000,000 ore find by Texas Gulf Sulphur.

Many other Toronto houses paid two or three weeks. Included were Thoms, Keruegan and Co. Ltd., T. A. Richardson and Co. and Wills, Bickle and Co.

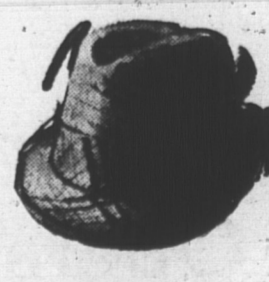
