FROM a traveller we learn the apple crop of the Annapolis Valley is very promising. The darker-skins has made its appearance, and fruit growers are fighting it vigorously. The crops in that section of Nova Scotia are also in advance of this province.

The annual district meeting of the P. E. I. Methodist churches was held at Alberton, commencing on Tuesday, 14th inst., and ending at a late hour Wednesday night. The meeting was one of the most successful yet held. Nineteen clergymen and some twelve or thirteen laymen were present. A full report will appear later.

Allin, carrying a box containing a fine pair of No. 6 patent leather shoes, paid a visit to the GUARDIAN office yesterday, and desired, on behalf of his bank, to express his most grateful thanks to Mr. Crabbe, of the Finance Committee for the speedy settlement of the damage sustained by him a short time ago. It is pleasing to see that our city aldermen are prompt in the transaction of important business and do not believe in relegating grievances to committees for the simple purpose of disposing of them.

The Abraham Sutton made the quickest trip to Newfoundland and returns that has been made for many years, if not the quickest on record. The round trip was made inside of 8 days, although being detained a day in Cow Bay. Mr. P. Blake, who went down and returned by her, states that he is highly pleased with the boat, and also with the captain and officers who did all that could be desired to make the trip pleasant. The markets at present are dull, and pretty well glutted with live stock. Mr. Blake was fortunate, however. Landing at 8 o'clock in the morning, with 70 cattle and 87 sheep, at 6 o'clock p. m., the whole shipment was sold and delivered. It is unfortunate that the expense of shipping cattle to this market is so large—duty, freight and other ordinary expenses amounting to 34 per cent. The idea that the duty has been taken off of cattle is not correct, as live stock did not stand upon the extra duty list, which was reduced. This is the first direct shipment and return to the Nfd. market for a length of time, and Mr. McMillan is to be congratulated on opening up to the public these superior facilities of shipping.
