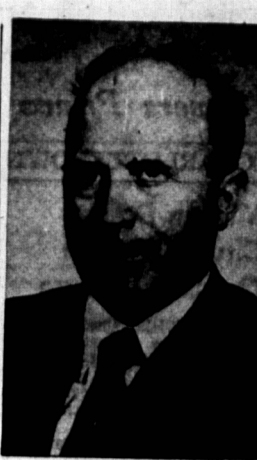

Seeks Improved Trade Relations With Canada

"There is very little direct trade between your province and my country, but I do see quite a few Volkswagens on your streets," Dr. L. A. Fabel, Consul of the Federal Republic of Germany told The Guardian here yesterday. Dr. Fabel has his headquarters at Montreal. He represents his country in Quebec and the Atlantic Provinces and is now completing a trip to the Maritimes. There are other consulates at Toronto, Winnipeg, Edmonton and Vancouver. The Consul yesterday called on Premier A. W. Matheson and met a few of his colleagues including Hon. Eugene Cullen, Minister of Agriculture and Hon. Douglas MacKinnon, Minister of Industry and Natural Resources.

His special task is to improve trade relations and expand commercial developments between the two countries. He noted that Canada and Germany are presently battling for the third spot among the world's trading nations. "But fortunately," he noted, "we are not competing against each other in specific products."

BUYS CANADIAN WHEAT
"We are among your most important buyers of wheat. We also buy iron ore, copper, aluminum and asbestos. And our new air force is being completely equipped with Canadian jet fighter planes," he observed.
"We buy from you much more than we sell to your country but we do sell toy machines, heavy machinery and hardware of all kinds to Canada," he explained. "We also sell cotton against increasingly strong competition from Japan."

like to sell this Province some fish drying equipment. "As a European," he observed, "I would like to see you serve and sell much more smoked fish of all kinds. Smoked herring, he said is a popular food among workmen in his part of Europe. It replaces meat to a great extent. It is also popular among other classes of people."
Dr. Fabel is a former professor of economics and political science at a University in Peking and at Manhattan College, New York City. The diplomatic service is comparatively new to him but he was very happy to note that he is received very cordially everywhere he goes in this country, although he was in conflict not so many years ago.

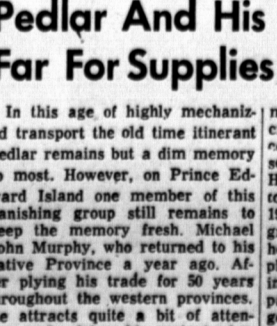

Priest's Experience As Pro Wrestler Used During Attack

RIDGEWAY, Ont. (CP)—Robert A. Rosenberger, 57, of Buffalo, N.Y., who was charged with attempting to murder a 250-pound Roman Catholic priest who said he called on his experience as a professional wrestler to knock out his attacker with a single jaw-shattering punch.
Rosenberger, who had been in hospital since July 4 with his jaw broken in two places, walked into the Ontario provincial police station here Wednesday night and said he heard he was wanted for the attack on Rt. Rev. Franklin M. Kelliher, 53 who wrestled 20-odd years ago as "the Masked Marvel."
Police took him to Welland, 13 miles from here, booked him for attempted murder and assault and lodged him in the Welland County Jail.
Msgr. Kelliher, chaplain of the Erie County Jail in Buffalo and director of the boys' home, said he and Rosenberger occupied summer homes about a block apart in the resort of Oakhill Forest near here.
The priest said a man phoned him the night of July 4 and ut-

tered a string of obscenities. The clerk suggested the two meet to talk over the reasons for the caller's agitation.
AVOIDED CAR
Msgr. Kelliher said he walked along the street and saw a car backing from the driveway of a nearby home.
"He turned the car around and headed right at me, very fast," Msgr. Kelliher said. "I ran up on a lawn; the car came after me and I jumped aside."
"Then this man jumped from the car and I could see a knife glinting in the moonlight."
"He kept using obscene language and was repeating, 'I saw your picture in the paper.' I saw 'I don't know the man at all and I can give no reason for the attack. I was forced to defend myself.'"
Dorothy Rohan, the clergyman's cousin, phoned police. Msgr. Kelliher said Rosenberger had lived in Canada for several years. Bail was fixed at \$5,000.
