Nova Scotia Liberals Say Support Lacking

OTTAWA (CP) — Nova Scotia Liberals complained Tuesday that the central party organization has cut down on support for the party in that province since its beatings there in the 1957 and 1958 federal elections.

All Nova Scotia seats went to the Progressive Conservatives in the last general election.

C. Elmer Bragg of Collingwood, president of the Nova Scotia Liberal Association, pointed to lessened support from the national organization in his annual report to the advisory council of the National Liberal Federation.

Open Meet Seen At Wimbledon

LONDON (AP) — Basil Reay, secretary of the International Tennis Federation, said Monday he was "certain" that future Wimbledon championships will be open to professionals starting in 1961.

Reay returned from a weekend meeting of a special committee of the federation in Paris. The committee recommended that eight of the world's leading tournaments be made open events, with the world's leading professionals and amateurs competing together.

"At least half the national tennis federations concerned will not agree," Reay told newsmen.

"But I am certain Wimbledon will be one of the championships which will agree to become open and include professionals.

The committee's recommendations will go before next year's annual meeting of the federation. That would make "open" international tournaments possible in 1961 at the earliest.

CONTRACT BRIDGE

When the American pair held the North-South cards, the bidding went as shown. The two clubs bid was artificial and requested North to show a four-card major suit if he had one.

A diamond was led and declarer played low from dummy, hoping West had led away from the jack. But East won with the jack and returned a trump.

South could have made the slam in one of several ways, but he elected to play for a Vienna coup and then misguessed the situation at the end and wound up going down two-100 points.

But the Argentine pair had no trouble with the play because they bid the hand differently and wound up at six notrump with North the declarer. The bidding went:

The four diamond bid was encouraging and, in effect, constituted a spade raise. Four notrump was Blackwood, and the five club response (South American version) showed three aces. Five notrump called for the number of kings, and the response of six clubs showed none.

It was thus evident to South that the opponents held the diamond and club kings, and it was also quite likely that East had them both, since he had doubled four diamonds and five clubs.

An opening lead of one of the minor suits by West through North at a contract of six spades therefore became marked as dangerous. Accordingly, South bid six notrump so that the opening lead would come from East.

This proved to be a wise decision. Played by North, the slam could not be defeated. Declarer took a club finesse in the course of the play, but had twelve tricks after the finesse lost.

Ingo Is Named Fighter Of Year

 NEW YORK (AP) — Heavyweight champion Ingemar Johansson of Sweden Tuesday was named "fighter of the year" by the Boxing Writers Association.

The undefeated, 27-year-old Swede thus became the first European to be chosen for boxing's highest award — the Edward J. Neil memorial plaque. The award dates back to 1938 when the great Jack Dempsey was chosen.

The only non-American ever to be named before was Cuba's Kid Gavilan, the welterweight champion, in 1953. Light heavyweight champion Archie Moore of San Diego, Calif., was the 1958 winner.

Johansson earned the prize with his devastating, seven-knockdown, third round defeat of Floyd Patterson in their title fight at Yankee Stadium last June 26.

The hard-hitting Viking became the fourth heavyweight ever to win the championship without a defeat to mar his record. He has won 22 fights, 14 by knockouts, since turning pro after the 1952 Olympics.

Presentation of the Neil plaque will be made at the BWA's annual dinner Jan. 14 at the Waldorf-Astoria.

The trophy is named in memory of the famed Associated Press sports writer who was killed in 1938 while covering the Spanish Civil war.
