Survival Program Hit By Austerity

OTTAWA (CP) — The national survival program has been dealt a severe blow by the government's announced program, informants said Monday.

The program, mainly the responsibility of the army, will not be affected. These programs come under the Emergency Management Organization, a direct responsibility of Prime Minister Diefenbaker.

Source said there will be no repetition of the militia training courses in survival techniques carried out last winter. The army trained some 70,000 militiamen in the target, was 100,000 — in how to operate mobile columns to rescue persons, in "rental of telephone control traffic and the like.

Informants said plans for a complete network of fallout reporting stations—some 2,000 in all—have been temporarily shelved.

Provinces Unaffected

The defence department's original allocation for the national survival program in 1962-3 was \$40,500,000, including \$23,000,000 for target area headquarters construction, \$6,500,000 for communications equipment and some \$11,000,000 for mechanical equipment.

Air Cadets Return Home
