DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

House of Commons.

THE RE-DISTRIBUTION BILL.

Mr. Flint resumed the debate on the re-distribution bill. He admitted that the proposed bill was not a gerrymander as far as Nova Scotia was concerned. It was the principle of the bill that he objected to. He was of the same opinion as Mr. Davies in regard to the legal point raised by Mr. Davies.

Mr. Hughes followed, dealing at length with the manner in which the Mowat Government gerrymandered the Province of Ontario. Yet the gerrymander condemned them for doing so. He showed that Mr. Mowat, through his gerrymander bill, held power in Ontario to-day, notwithstanding that he had a minority of over five thousand in the Province. The repugnance speeches of McCarthy and O'Brien reminded him of the utterances of reformed renegades in religion.

PRESBYTERIAN NEWS.

The General Assembly.

Dr. Wardrop preached the opening sermon before the Presbyterian General Assembly. Rev. Dr. Caven and Rev. Thos. Sedgwick, were nominated for the moderatorship, Dr. Caven being successful, 115 to 82. Rev. Dr. Fraser, clerk of the Assembly, has resigned on account of old age.

Although some of the leading spirits of the general presbytery got to work to-day this great religious parliament will not get down to business until to-morrow. The majority of the three hundred and sixty delegates have arrived. The retiring moderator, Rev. Dr. Wardrop, preached this evening, and Dr. Caven, of Toronto, and Rev. Thos. Sedgwick, of Tatungouche, N. S., were nominated for the moderatorship, Rev. Dr. Caven being the successful candidate. The vote stood, Caven 115, Sedgwick 92. The resignation of Rev. Dr. Fraser, of Barrie, as recording clerk of the assembly was presented and referred to a special committee.

The Canadian Fisheries.

(Daily Bulletin.)

HALIFAX, June 8. Nova Scotia—Cod fishing was excellent to-day at Spry Bay, Good at Port Medway, fair at Digby, Lunenburg and Lunenburg and a few at Whitehead and Canso. Herring fair at Spry Bay, but poor at Lunenburg and Whitehead. Lobsters plentiful at Digby, fair at Port Medway, poor at Lunenburg, Lunenburg, Spry Bay, Whitehead and Canso. Mackerel in abundance at Canso, fair at Lunenburg and a few at Whitehead. Haddock good at — and fair at Lunenburg and Port Medway. Light catches of hake and halibut and salmon at Lunenburg and good of salmon and a few gasperaux at Port Medway.

Cape Breton—Cod fair at St. Ann's, but poor at Cheticamp and Port Hood; white boats at Lunenburg average two quintals cod and from two to three barrels of herring and mackerel. Lobsters fair at St. Ann's, poor at Cheticamp; and herring and lobsters poor at St. Peters and Port Hood as well as Arichat.

P. E. Island—Cod and lobsters are fair at Georgetown. Lobsters scarce at Bloomfield. Quebec—Cod, herring and lobsters good at Percé; and cod fair, lobsters poor, and caplin in abundance at Grand River. Belt and Ice—Herring bait by fishermen's nets, on Bay Shore, and bait in traps in St. Mary's Bay; Ice procurable at Digby, Lunenburg, Canso and Georgetown.
