## Island Trade Board Moves Nearer Formation Stage

Formation of a Prince Edward Island Associated Board of Trade moved forward last night with the appointment of a representative committee charged with drawing up a constitution under which the proposed new association would operate.

Decision to take this important step was made at a joint meeting held in Crapaud's community hall. Present were delegates representing the four active boards in the province: Charlottetown, Summerside, Crapaud-Victoria and Alberton-West-Prince.

George Nicholson, president of the Crapaud-Victoria board was

chairman. W.A. Gaudet, secretary of the Charlottetown group was secretary.

Named to the constitution committee were Mr. Gaudet, chairman; Max Thompson, representing the Crapaud-Victoria board; Cyril Leard, representing the Alberton-West-Prince board; and John S. Wright, representing the Summerside board.

Drafts of the constitution will be presented to a general meeting of each organization concerned prior to the next joint meeting.

During the Crapaud meeting the fact that Kings County was not represented was viewed with concern by several speakers.

Re-activation of the Souris and Montague boards was seen as one of the first projects requiring the attention of the new association, if and when organized.

## Thomas Moyses Will Observe 95th Birthday At Bedeque

BEDEQUE — Observing his 95th birthday this Sunday, Thomas Moyses, lifelong resident of Bedeque, blind a few years ago, is now able to read regularly, is active about the house each day, and acknowledges that he is enjoying "fairly good health".

Born October 25th, 1864, in Central Bedeque, on a farm home now occupied by Walter Hogg, he remained for the next 74 years on this farm homestead. On his retirement 21 years ago, with his wife, the former Miss Alice Hart of Sackville, they came to Bedeque village, where they have since resided with their daughter, Edna, Mrs. W. N. Jenkins.

Other members of their family of four children are Dr. Henry Moyses in Summerside, Fred Moyses in Streetsville, Ont., and Amy, Mrs. Wright Leard of Central Bedeque.

Until a year ago Mr. Moyses was able to do considerable work with gardening being a special interest, but during the past few months had been under doctors care because of a heart ailment. At present he enjoys apparent good health.

From his early youth Mr. Moyses has been deeply interested in church and Sunday School work, and for 70 years, from the age of 19 to 90, he was a member of the choir of Bedeque United Church.

Always interested in the welfare of his community and province, Mr. Moyses has been a life-long ardent advocate of total abstinence from alcoholic beverages.

## Abandoned Scow Sighted In Gulf

HALIFAX (CP) — An RCAF spokesman said Wednesday that a scow which broke free of its tow Oct. 12 was sighted from the Air Tuesday north of the Magdalen Islands.

Shipping in the Gulf of St. Lawrence has been warned of the hazard.

L. E. Wellner, general manager of Maritime Dredging Limited, owners of the scow, said last night that the craft, a 100-yard dump type, broke loose at noon on Oct. 12 at a point approximately 100 miles off the Gaspe coast.

At the time she was being tow-

ed to Charlottetown by the company tug "Brigadoon". High winds and heavy seas were blamed for the mishap.

Mr. Wellner said that locating a floating object of that size was like attempting to find a needle in a haystack so the company had decided to abandon the scow to the underwriters.

Now that it had been sighted it was possible that the underwriters would attempt to salvage her, he said.

The scow was spotted Monday by the crew of a Lancaster aircraft stationed at Summerside RCAF Station.

## S'ide Police Hunt Vandals

SUMMERSIDE—A rash of window breaking has broken out in Summerside during the past ten days, in which time several buildings were the object of attack by vandals.

Several panes of glass were broken at the M.F. Schurman Company, the Presbyterian Church Hall and the High School, where it is believed that teachers, instructing night classes, may have been the targets.

The Presbyterian hall suffered the heaviest damage when about fifteen panes were knocked out in a few days.

Some of the windows appear to have been broken by means of a B-B gun or sling shot, while stones have been used against others in the wave of wanton destruction.

Summerside police are on the alert and have various areas under surveillance each evening.

## HIT-AND-RUN ATTACK

TAIPEI, Formosa (Reuters)—A Nationalist Chinese news agency claimed Monday that a large guerrilla force on mainland China staged a hit-and-run attack on Communist garrisons at the end of last month. The attack was carried out by 12,000 anti-Communist guerrillas based in the mountainous region of Taipeihsan in central China, the Ta Tao news agency said.

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
