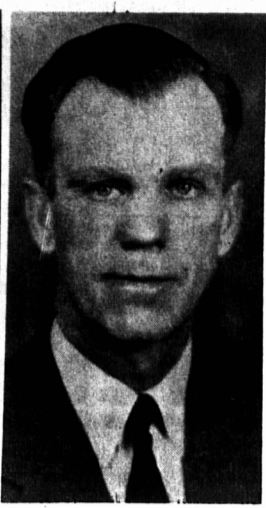

Lib. Candidates Nominated For 4th District Of Queens

Mon. Dougald MacKinnon, Minister of Public Works, and Mr. Harold Smith of Pownal, both members of the last House of Assembly, were nominated to represent the Fourth District of Queens at a largely attended convention of the Liberal party held at Eldon on Saturday night. Mr. MacKinnon will be running his sixth election. He has been defeated in the five previous contests. Mr. Smith, a farmer and shipper, was elected to the House in a by-election of 1953.

Memorial Day Observed By Nurses In Ch'town

Nurses' Memorial Day was fittingly observed by the nursing profession in the City by church attendance at St. Paul's Anglican Church and attendance at Mass at the Chapel of the Charlottetown Hospital. His Excellency, Bishop MacEachern was celebrant at the 8:30 Mass for members of the Roman Catholic Nurse's Association. During the Mass, beautiful hymns were sung by the Sister's Choir. Flowers for the altar were donated by the MacInnis Family, in memory of the late Florence MacInnis, R.N. Bishop MacEachern, in speaking to the nurses following the communion breakfast, cautioned them against becoming impersonal in their relationships with patients in times when so many demands are made upon their services.

He also spoke on the role of the Catholic nurse in society, pointing out her responsibility towards her family, her neighbourhood, province and country. Referring to unity among Catholic nurses, the Bishop urged nurses to be active members of their organizations, stating that it is by group, rather than individual effort that greater things can be accomplished towards improving their own status of life and the betterment of mankind.

Blue Prince To Operate On 10-Day Schedule, St. John's

The motor vessel "Blue Prince" which is now operated by the Bonavista Cold Storage Company in Newfoundland has been chartered by the Provincial Government to operate between Charlottetown and St. John's, Newfoundland for the coming season. This announcement was made last evening by Hon. Eugene Cullen, Minister of Industries and Natural Resources. The Blue Prince is the ship which was used on this run for the last three years and was operated by the Blue Peter Steamship Company on a sixteen day schedule. The Blue Peter Company refused to renew their agreement with the Government last Fall and since that time every steamship company on the East Coast has been approached without results until the Bonavista Company came to terms. Under the present charter the ship will operate on a ten day schedule and should give a better service.

Mr. Cullen states that the Blue Prince was the only ship with "tween" decks suitable for hauling cattle, that could be procured. At present the ship is in dry dock at Halifax and is expected to reach Charlottetown toward the latter part of the week. An announcement will appear in the press tomorrow giving more details as to the time of its arrival. The Minister points out that the Blue Prince which has been operating on the sixteen-day schedule for the past three years was found to be too small to accommodate the freight shipped from here to Newfoundland but expressed the hope that with the change-over to the ten-day schedule, some relief can be expected in this direction. This improved service will tend to increase the trade from Newfoundland to this Province and makes the suggestion that anyone wishing to import from there might use the ship to good advantage. He is also hopeful that a Federal subsidy for this service will be forthcoming in the near future.

Suspect Death Is Hit-and-run Case

NEWCASTLE, N.B. (CP)—Possible victim of a hit-and-run accident, Joseph Malley, 18, of nearby Paterson, Siding, was found dead early Sunday on a roadside near the small community. Death was attributed to a skull fracture. Dr. E. H. Freeman, coroner, empanelled a jury to view the body and an inquest will be held at a late date to be set. A post-mortem examination will be made today at Moncton.
