THE SUGAR BEET IN MAINE.—The Maine Observer says that sugar beet stock is below par in that State owing to the partial failure of last year's crop.

REV. MR. HINSON will preach in the Baptist Chapel on Sunday next, the 20th inst., morning and evening, at the usual hours, 11 a. m., and 6.30 p. m.

THOMAS McCLOSKEY, arrested for being drunk and fighting with the police yesterday, was sentenced to one month's imprisonment to-day by the Stipendiary Magistrate.

THE Captain of the brig, "Caribbean," reports having seen off Cape Sable, while on the voyage from the West Indies to Annapolis, N. S., an enormous devil fish, which he calculated to measure some 90 feet in length.

CODFISH have been caught in the harbor, and at several well-known resorts along this coast within the last few days. Large hauls are reported from the north side of the Island.—K. C. Advertiser.

A GREAT revival of business is reported from Queen's County, N. S. At Port Medway six vessels are loading lumber, a sight not seen for many years; and idle men cannot be found. Fishing is being prosecuted to an extent never before known.

LAUNCHED, on Thursday, the 10th instant, from the shipyard of Mr. Robert Ellis, Bideford, Lot 12, for the Hon. John Yeo, a very superior barquentine named the *Sunbeam*, 400 tons register, to class 8 years A1 in English Lloyd's.

The following committee has been appointed by the Dominion Government to confer with the New York and Ontario Governments respecting the creation of an International Park at Niagara Falls: Sir Alex. Campbell, Senator Allen, J. B. Plumb, M. P.; and A. Desjardins, M. P.

The barn and the outbuildings of Mr. John Gidley, on Mount Edward Road, were totally consumed by fire yesterday. We learn that a colt, which was grazing near the barn at the time of the fire, ran into the building and was burned to death. Mr. Gidley also lost a number of farming implements by the fire.

IMPORTATION OF LIVE CATTLE.—The largest cargo of live stock hitherto imported from America arrived recently by the steamer Iowa, from Boston at Liverpool, consisting of 734 cattle, 500 sheep, and 200 pigs. Only six animals died on the voyage.

ON Thursday evening Mr. George Mason, of Clifton, Lot 48, had a leg broken at Mr. Allan Stewart's forge, Southport, while holding his horse for Mr. Stewart to shoe him. The horse reared and struck Mr. Mason with his fore foot and broke his (Mr. M's) leg, below the knee. Dr. McLeod was at Southport at the time of the accident, and set the broken limb. After the leg was set Mr. Mason was conveyed to his home.

BAPTIST S. SCHOOL AND CHOIR CONCERT.—The Concert, last night, at the Baptist Chapel was greeted with a fair audience. We regret that the Sabbath School had not more part in it. The performances by the little ones were really interesting. Hattie Heartz, little Ada Hendry, and the little Fillmore girls, fully sustained their reputation, and were heartily welcomed to the platform. The second part, by the choir—assisted by others, occupied rather too much of the time. Messrs. Earl and Vinnicombe's instrumental performances were simply exquisite, and were highly appreciated. The duett "Whispering Hope," by Misses Scott and Currie was well rendered. Solo and quartette, "Do they pray for me?" by Misses Davies and Cooper, and Messrs. Stiggins and Knight is worthy of note. The parts by Misses Scott, McLeod and Currie were rendered with good taste. The choir of the Baptist Church has made marked progress during the last year. The concert last night, however, was not by any means up to the entertainments given by them and the school on previous occasions. The programme was not varied enough and was by far too long. Mr. J. S. Brown's reading—"Wanted a Minister" showed that Mr. B. has quite a talent for reading. "The Raven" has so often been presented before an audience in this city that we regretted that Mr. Hinson did not try his splendid voice on some other selection.

New York, June 16.

The Tammany committee on organization, this afternoon, completed arrangements for delegates to go to the Cincinnati convention. A resolution was passed declaring that all the members of Tammany Hall organization would support a third candidate for the presidency if Tilden was the nominee of the Democratic party, and that the members of the committee would do all in their power to defeat Tilden.

A telegram from an official source in Havana says that neither the Capt in General nor Commandant General of the naval squadron has any knowledge that any American vessel, or a vessel of any other foreign nation, has been detained or searched by a Spanish man-of-war, and deny that there is any such man-of-war as the *Nunica*.

DUBLIN, June 16.

Five families who, yesterday, were evicted with some difficulty near Balla, were last night conducted back to their holdings by a large crowd.

LONDON, June 16.

The Port has forwarded its reply to the identical note to each ambassador. The Porte refuses to recognize the right of the Powers to arbitrarily dispose of any portion of Turkey in favor of Greece without consulting the Porte.

A majority of the ambassadors disapprove of Mr. Goschen's suggestion to send a commission of inquiry to Roumelia as it might interfere with the operations of the local commission of Spat.

BERLIN, June 16.

It is understood that instructions have been sent to the ambassadors here directing that they adhere in principle to the French programme. It is said that Sabouroff, on behalf of Russia, has been instructed to cordially co-operate with the other Powers.

ROME, June 16.

In clerical circles nothing is known of the intention of Belgium to recall the minister from the Vatican.

LONDON, June 16.

At the anniversary festival of the Society for the Aid of Foreigners in Distress, last night, the Prince of Wales toasted the Society. Minister Lowell responded in a humorous speech, in which he said he fully sympathized with distressed foreigners.

ST. PETERSBURG, June 16.

Advices from Kuldjal and Fort Naryn state that the Chinese prevent Russian caravans crossing the frontier. It is rumored that the Chinese have taken Fort Naryn.

LONDON, June 16.

The "Times" says that the facts seem to indicate that Roca has been elected President of the Argentine Republic, and that Buenos Ayres will resent his election as it did that of Avellaneda. The latter, who is responsible for order until September, seems to have succeeded in avoiding civil strife.

PANAMA, June 7.

A Chili despatch states that the terms of peace that the Government are disposed to offer the allies are rather severe. Bolivia is required to resign all right to the territory of Atacama, as far as the Loa, which is hereafter to be the dividing line between Peru and Chili. Bolivia's dominion on the east will cease forever. Peru's share of the penalty for making war on Chili is placed at \$200,000,000, and as a pledge until such is effected Chili will retain the district of Tarcapa.

PARIS, June 16.

In the Senate, yesterday M. Ferry, on behalf of the tariff committee interpellated the Government on that and other international questions. Premier DeFreycinet replied that the Government could not engage to conclude a treaty before a fixed date. The Government had a constitutional right to conclude treaties of commerce on its own initiative, but the Chamber had a right to reject or accept such treaties, after they were concluded. France, he said, was bound by M. Say's letter, not by Lord Granville's. No engagement existed in regard to the date or beyond what was specified in Say's letter. He also said the opinion of a foreign Government could not be discussed in that place.

NEW YORK, June 16.

President Babcock denies that there was a lack of equipment, or that there was inefficiency on the part of the officers on either the steamers *Narraganset* or *Stonington*.

The "Parvener," of Nicaragua, May 22, confirms the announcement of the ratification of the interoceanic canal contract, and says the news was received with the wildest enthusiasm throughout the Republic.

The Panama "Star and Herald" says the publication of the order of the President of Columbia, requesting the retirement of the United States vessels *Adams* and *Kearsage* from Columbian waters has occasioned the liveliest excitement in Costa Rica. It is denounced as a violation of Costa Rica's sovereignty, and has been made the subject of a protest on the part of the Minister of Foreign Affairs.
