SICKNESS AND STARVATION.

Sad Scenes at Labrador.

QUEBEC, Aug. 17. The Dominion steamer Alert arrived from Labrador at Gaspé, says that the reports about the prevailing diphtheria, la grippe and starvation at Labrador, and on the north and northwest coast of Newfoundland, are true. The people there are destitute of food and clothing, and are almost helpless through weakness.

Van Horne's Return.

MONTREAL, Aug. 17. President Van Horne, of the Canada Pacific Railway, returned Saturday night from England. He says there is no truth in the rumors as to the amalgamation of the Grand Trunk and the Canadian Pacific Railways, or in the supposed arrangements between the Canadian Pacific and the New York Central.

Sunday Disturbances.

TORONTO, Aug. 17. There were more disturbances in Queen's Park, Toronto, yesterday. Several persons attempted to hold religious service, when the police interfered. Several persons were hurt and the mob tore down part of the park railing.

TORONTO, Aug. 17.—10 a. m. Fair in western portions; rain followed by clearing in eastern.

Fishery Bulletin.

(Fisheries Intelligence Bureau Report.)

HALIFAX, Aug. 17.—Bait very scarce at English Bay, but codfish plentiful, four boats that obtained small baiting having taken three quintals each. At Fox Bay codfishing poor, but squid plentiful. Quebec codfishing good at Sheldrake, Hunter River, St. John River, Mappie and Long Point. Fair at Perce, Grand River and Newport Point, but poor at all other stations. Luncheon good at Seven Islands, Moisie, Sheldrake, Thunder River and Long Point. A fair catch of herring at Newport Point.

P. E. I.—No mackerel at Miminigash, and all fisheries in the vicinity of Alberton are so dull that the fishermen are becoming despondent.

Cape Breton.—As far as reported fish is very dull. The best reports codfishing fair, when bait is obtainable.

Nova Scotia.—Codfishing reported fair at Whitehead, Spry Bay and Digby; good inshore at Lunenburg, a few herring at Whitehead and Lunenburg, a fair haul of cod at Arichat; a few cod, haddock, mackerel and squid and Ingonish, and about half a quintal of cod per boat at Louisburg. The Victoria arrived at St Peter's from Eastern banks with eighty quintals, and fair catches at Tusket River and Digby. Small mackerel reported taking hooks freely at Tusket River; fair catches at Digby and seining quite lively in St Mary's Bay. The dogfish have left the Bay of Fundy, and at Digby the hake and haddock fisheries are again very good. Bait squid plentiful at Fox Bay and Anticosti; fair at Perce and Newport Point, Quebec and Spry Bay, N. S.

An Explanation.

SIR,—The question has been frequently asked during the past week, Why has the Caledonian Club gathering gone to Summerside this year?

The answer is simply this: the directors of the Charlottetown Driving Park last year charged what the Club considered an exorbitant sum for the use of their grounds, and, therefore, not feeling disposed to submit to a repetition of the same imposition this year, the Club resolved on making a change.

The Summerside Driving Park was readily placed at the disposal of the Club, at a nominal sum, and every facility given by the owners of the Park, and the Town Council as well, to make the Gathering of the Clubs a success. Train arrangements were also made on an extended scale; the result being that fully three thousand spectators witnessed the games at Summerside.

The fact that the Caledonian Club is the only society that has invested any of its funds in the Charlottetown Driving Park led its members to feel keenly the unfair advantage sought to be taken by the managers of that Park, and true to their motto, they resolved to resent it.
