## Youth Acquitted On Theft Charge

SUMMERSIDE—In a town police court yesterday morning, Magistrate R.S. Hinton, QC, acquitted a Sherbrooke youth on a charge of theft of a suit of clothes.

Lea Compton was charged after what has now been termed a "misunderstanding." An employee of Corney's Family Store, he was charged after a suit of clothes he said he planned to purchase was missing from the store.

The first crown witness was Kenneth Albin Cain, manager of the local store, who refused to be sworn (on religious grounds). He had taken an oath three years ago, but his religion did not permit it now.

He said that Compton told him he was interested in a suit, he wanted it for his brother's wedding. It wasn't taken from the store with the manager's permission, manager Cain told the court.

On cross examination, he said that the accused had tried the suit on, but that he had not purchased it. He said that he did not report the theft but related what had happened to RCMP.

## Insurance Coverage Extended, Good News

Effective April 1, 1967, unemployment insurance coverage will be extended to employment in agriculture and horticulture, minister of labour, Hon. John Nicholson, announced yesterday.

C. L. Winchester, manager of the Charlottetown office of the Unemployment Insurance Commission, said in an interview yesterday that he expects that regulations giving effect to the ministers announcement will be released early in December, 1966.

**COVERAGES OUTLINED**  
Pending approval of the regulations by the Governor in Council, it is only possible to outline the proposed coverage in general terms.

The proposal is to extend coverage to all employees in agriculture and horticulture working under a contract of service, with the exception of:— workers who are members of the employer's family; workers who are themselves operators of farms, and employment for which no cash wages are paid.

In general, this means that the farmer's employees will be covered, but not the farmer who employs them.

**REGISTRATION OF FARMERS**  
All farmers on Prince Edward Island will register at the Unemployment Insurance Commission offices, and Mr. Winchester suggested that they

should not wait until late in the period, but should register with the UIC as soon as possible.

To save time for themselves and to minimize the peak workload he suggests that farmers drop into the UIC offices at any time in the near future when they are in town. If any additional information is required by farmers or farm groups, Mr. Winchester and his UIC staff will be pleased to supply it.
