The Old Northern Light Again—The French Warship. June 28 4i

FOUR young men—Finlay McDonald, John Chisholm, Frederick Bourke and Daniel Callan—were arrested yesterday by Marshall Cameron for being drunk and using profane language on the Southport steamer on Sunday.

TWENTY members of the fire department leave here on Wednesday morning to take part in the Ch'town firemen's tournament, under command of District Engineer Blake. The party will be accompanied by the Artillery band.—St. John Sun.

We were informed that we were in error in our biographical sketch of Rev. Dr. Wilson, in yesterday's issue, as to his being of Irish and Scotch parentage. Dr. Wilson cannot claim the honor of representing the Irish Nationality as he is of purely Scottish birth.

DR. OROBYNATEKAH, supreme chief ranger of the Independent Order of Foresters, has reached Toronto from England, where he succeeded in making arrangements for the registration of the order in England. He may therefore be expected on the Island.

An unintentional omission was made in our report of the 21st in reference to the re-opening of the Methodist Church in Pownal on Sunday last. Rev. J. Miles (Baptist) preached a most acceptable sermon at 3 o'clock in the afternoon, founded on Romans 8: 2, 3 and 4 verses.

J. W. Brehaut, B. A., who has been studying the past session at Harvard, is in the city on a short visit. He will accept a position in September on the teaching staff of the Western P. E. public school.—Hfr. Herald. Mr. Brehaut belongs to Murray Harbor, P. E. I.

The crops throughout New Brunswick and Nova Scotia are said by travellers to be much in advance of ours on the Island. Although the crops looked very forward a few weeks ago, the weather has been too cold for rapid vegetation, and the grain looks backward enough for the season.

THE MIGHTY FALLON—The steamer Northern Light, the property of Messrs E. Lantulum & Co., has been removed from Magee's to Walker's wharf, where the machinery is being taken out. The vessel, it is said, will be sold to outside parties to be used as a coal carrier.—St. John Telegraph.

It is said that a man named Langlos, of the stores department at McAdam Junction, had a narrow escape from a terrible death a few days ago. He is not very popular and a dynamite cartridge was fixed under the car he was in. It failed to explode and was found by the car inspector.—Moncton Transcript.

The public meeting in the Methodist church this evening will be in the interests of the Suspension Fund, the object of which is the augmentation of the incomes of missionaries.
