Hoopsters Get Tired

With football over and hockey in full swing the average Canadian fan is devoting his attention to hockey. However there is another great winter sport that has been very much in the spotlight to segment of sporting fans over the continent and this is basketball.

That is why I would like to devote a bit of space to the National Basketball Association, the hoop world's equivalent to the NHL or the NFL world's.

Pro basketball, as played today equals both hockey and football in as far as the expenditure of energy goes. Where NHL players compete in approximately 90 games, including playoffs and exhibitions, an NBA player will have donned his uniform about 120 times if his club is a title contender.

To get to a game any team must travel and this is where the NBA grind becomes so much harder than the other pro sports routines. Let us take Los Angeles Lakers as an example. To play a game in the East involves a bit more than one immediately thinks about.

Basketball is a strenuous sport and the ways the pros play it, contrary to popular opinion, involves more than a bit of body contact. When the scores run up into the hundreds, with only a couple of points separating the two clubs, mental pressure is bound to be a bit more acute than in hockey for where a hockey player might only get five or six shots on the net all evening, the hoopsters get anywhere between 20 and 30.

The pro game now emphasizes the fast break and for 40 straight minutes all a player does is streak back and forth the baskets. One university coach devised a home made device which he attached to one of his players and he found that each member ran roughly five miles a game.

Most people recognize names like Wilt Chamberlain, Oscar Robinson, Bill Russell, Jerry West, etc., etc., etc. However we seem to forget the average run of the mill player who depends on the game for his livelihood. It is rather a hard way to support a family to say the least.

2 Canadian Cities In Olympic Running

CHICAGO (AP)—The bidding deadline for the 1972 Olympics was reached Thursday with Detroit, Munich, Montreal and Madrid in competition for the summer games and Salt Lake City, Calgary and Sapporo, Japan, seeking the winter games.

Avery Brundage of Chicago, president of the International Olympic Committee, said he was notified by IOC headquarters at Lausanne, Switzerland, that Amsterdam had dropped out as a summer games candidate.

Sites of the 1968 Olympics already have been designated. The summer games were awarded to Mexico City and the winter games to Grenoble, France.

Hosts of the 1972 games will be determined by the IOC during a meeting in Rome about April 25, Brundage said.

Brundage said Munich and Montreal submitted bids to him for the 1972 Summer Olympics. The 74-year-old IOC boss said he lacked information on rumored bids by Amsterdam, where the 1928 Olympiad was held, or Vienna.

Visited by DRAPEAU Brundage said he was recently visited by Mayor Jean Drapeau of Montreal, who said a program of civic improvement for Expo 67 would leave the city in position to conduct the 1972 games.

Brundage declined comment on the chances of any city in the bidding for the 1972 games, but stressed that "pressure" lobbying tactics have been outlawed since the 1963 IOC meeting which awarded the 1968 games to Mexico City.

At that session, charges were exchanged that party-giving and gifts were used to influence IOC voting at Baden - Baden, Germany.

Earlier, Vienna notified the IOC at Lausanne of withdrawal of its bid to stage the summer games.

The notice was received several hours before the deadline for applications.

QUEBEC (CP)—Lionel Fleury president of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association said Thursday Fran Huck and Maurice Mott are eligible to play for Canada's national hockey team.

Red Wings Gain First; Beat Habs, Hawks Lose

DETROIT (AP)—Detroit Red Wings jumped past Chicago and Montreal into first place in the National Hockey League standings Thursday night by continuing their home ice-high over the Canadiens with a 5-3 victory.

Norm Ullman and Gordie Howe each scored a pair of goals and rookie defenceman Bert Marshall added three assists to lead the Red Wings in their seventh straight game without a setback.

Alex Delvecchio scored Detroit's other goal in the third period as the Red Wings extended their unbeaten streak at home over Montreal to 13 games.

Both of Montreal's goals came on power plays. Yvan Cournoyer tied the score at 12:12 of the first period with his 13th power-play goal in 14 goals he has scored this season.

Gilles Tremblay got the Canadiens' other marker at 11:41 of the final period after Howe and Delvecchio had pushed the Red Wings to a three-goal lead.

Bill Gadsby, who had blocked two early shots in the period, aided Howe in his first goal after breaking up a three-man Montreal rush by intercepting a pass deep in Detroit territory.

Delvecchio intercepted a Jean Beliveau pass and surprised Charlie Hodge to score his goal.

TWO SHOOT PUCK

On Ullman's first goal, he and Paul Henderson each appeared to have their stick on the puck and shot at the same time, the puck whizzing past Hodge on the short right side.

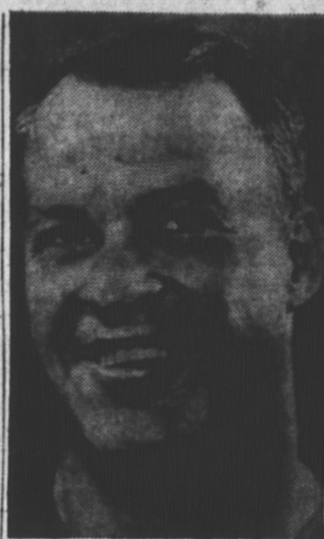
The Red Wings had the first power play of the game at 1:55 when Jacques Laperriere went off for elbowing. But the Red Wings could not get a decent shot on goal.

BAD GASTEIN, Austria (CP-AP)—Nancy Greene, a pretty but muscular blonde from Rossland, B.C., defeated the famed Goitschel sisters of France Thursday to win the slalom event in the Silver Jug women's ski meet here.

"I had two perfect runs," said the 22-year-old, Ottawa-born student after she negotiated the slalom courses in times of 42.25 and 45.60 seconds. She won the second run after placing third in the first one.

Miss Greene's slalom victory gave her second place in the combined downhill-slalom, won by Traudl Hecher of Austria. Miss Hecher, winner of Wednesday's downhill, placed 11th and third in the two slalom runs to roll up 11,648 points, compared with 14,487 for the Canadian. Third in the combined was Christl Haas of Austria with 30,968 points. Marielle Goitschel was fourth with 31,397 points.

A great second run gave Miss Greene her slalom victory by more than a second over Marielle Goitschel, the Olympic champion. Sister Christine Goitschel straddled a gate and fell, so was not a factor Thursday.

Disqualification Gives French Car Monte Carlo Title

MONTE-CARLO (AP) — A French car was declared winner of the Monte Carlo rally Thursday after a mass disqualification in a dispute over headlights.

Officials gave the top spot to Finnish drivers Pauli Toivonen and E. Mirkander after ruling out the three top finishers — all British Mini-Coopers — and seven others.

The official second and third place cars were Italian — built Lancia Flavias driven by Frenchmen Rene Trautman and J. P. Janrioud, and Sweden Ove Anderson and M. Dahlgren respectively.

The disqualifications were announced after the last 361-mile test which only 40 of the 69 starting cars finished. At that point and three top cars were Mini-Coopers driven by Timo Makinen of Finland and Paul Easter of Britain; Finn Raasuu Aaltonen and Briton Tony Ambrose, and Britons Paddy Hopkirk and Henry Liddon.

IRISH GIRLS BUMPED In addition, the leading contender for the women's trophy — two Irish girls — were bumped aside for a French team which never finished.

Officials said the British method of reducing headlight glare for oncoming drivers did not conform with regulations. All 10 cars disqualified, officials said, were using single-beam iodine vapor headlights and either separate lights or intensity-dimishing devices for the low beams required by regulations.
