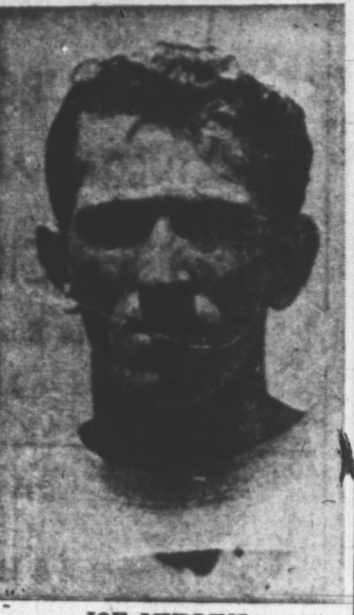


Glance Bay Ace Smashes Maritime 880-Yd. Record

With Joe Mullins, Glance Bay's speed demon, leading the way, new records including a new Maritime half-mile mark were topped at the Maritime championship track and field meet held here at Queen Elizabeth Park as part of Lobster Carnival celebrations Saturday.

Racing against the clock, Mullins lowered the old mark set by Peter Watson of Halifax in 1957 by 2.4 seconds in stepping the 880-yard distance in 1:54.6. Mullins also snapped a Lobster Carnival record racing the quarter-mile in 50.6 seconds.

Other carnival records were established by Dave MacLeod of Charlottetown in the javelin; Sandy Patterson of Boston in the discus; Alf Groom of Summerside in the pole vault; Doug MacKeon of Greenwood in the shot put; Bartley Duns of Greenwood in the high jump; Robin Ritchie of Greenwood in the broad jump; and Jim Corbett of Amherst in the pole vault.

MIDGET RECORD
Duns, a 15-year-old youngster from Greenwood RCAF Station, not only shattered a Canadian midget record when he cleared the bar in the high jump at 5 ft. 4 1/2 ins. Duns set the midget mark last Tuesday at Antigonish with a leap of 5 ft. 8 1/4 ins.

Meet officials said, however, that because he was competing in a senior tournament the mark would not be recognized as a midget record.

The meet's top athlete was versatile Jim Corbett of Amherst. Corbett scored 21 points, five better than runner-up Dave MacLeod of Charlottetown, who won the 100 and 200-yard dashes and the hop-step jump and finishing second in the high and broad jumps.

MacLeod broke his own carnival record tossing the javelin 165 ft. 4 1/2 ins.; earned second in the 100, shot put and hurdles and thirds in the high and broad jumps.

Summerside's Alf Groom scored 12 feet to set a record in the pole vault but his tries to break the Maritime record he set at Antigonish Wednesday, were unsuccessful at 13 ft. 6 ins. The Maritime record is 13 ft. 4 1/2 ins.

Cleveland bounced back into the American League lead by one percentage point Sunday when the Chicago White Sox lost a doubleheader to the New York Yankees.

San Francisco's National League lead was cut to 2 1/2 games when the Giants bowed to Pittsburgh while second-place Los Angeles split a pair with Philadelphia.

Nino Franconia helped the Cleveland Club regain first place by driving in three runs in the rain-shortened second game, won by the Indians 5-3. Boston won the opener 6-5 on Frank Malzone's double with the bases loaded and two out in the ninth. When the second game was interrupted for the second time, umpire John Flaherty waited 45 minutes through a thunderstorm. Boston was to bat in the last of the ninth but never got a chance to hit.

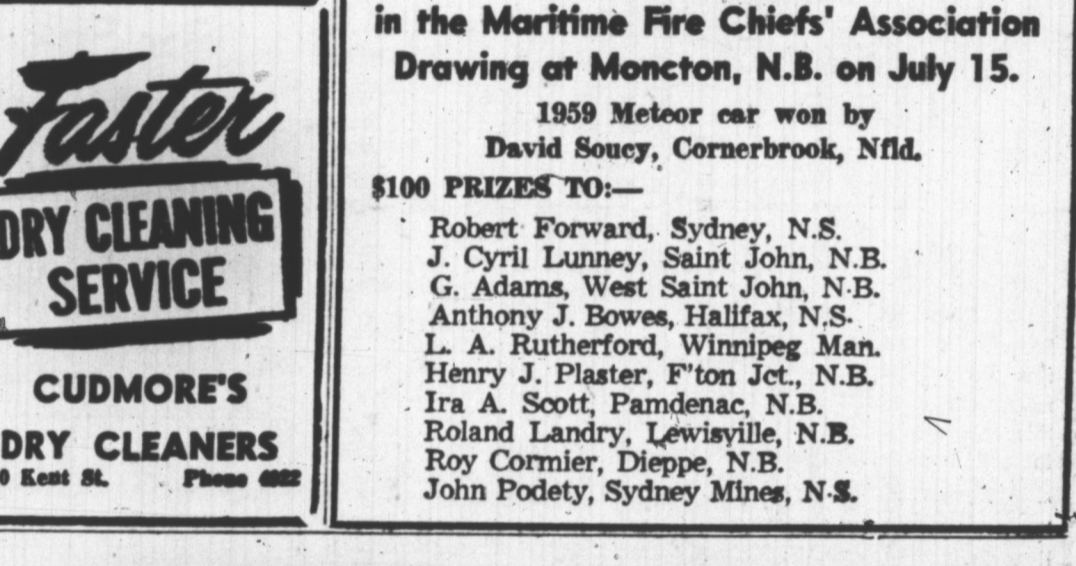

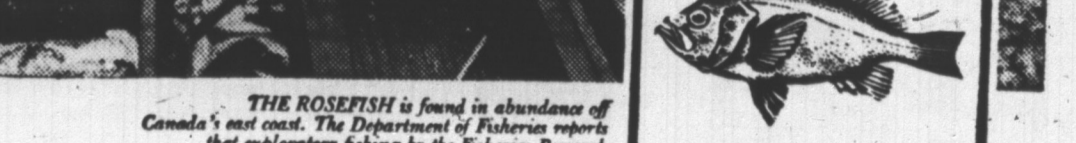
A rose is a bream is a perch—

THE ROSEFISH is variously called Red Bream and Ocean Perch. By name it was, until recent years, of little or no commercial or food value. Today, however, as Ocean Perch, it is a big favourite of Canadian housewives and an important factor in the livelihood of many Canadian east coast fishermen.

Turning point in the importance of the rosefish came with advancements in fish freezing and handling. The rosefish were automatically scaled and filleted, then quick frozen and sent to market as Ocean Perch. Their mild flavour and relatively low price won them instant popularity.

At the same time the growth of otter trawling with huge, open-mouthed nets made the catching of rosefish in large quantities a commercial possibility.

The Fisheries Research Board of Canada, the Department's scientific arm, has discovered many of the important grounds which are being fished today and others still untapped. The rosefish typifies the role—one of many—that the Department plays in developing Canada's vast and valuable fish resources.
