## Radical Socialist Party Votes To Expel Faure

PARIS (AP) — Radical Socialist party leaders Thursday voted to expel Premier Edgar Faure because his government's decision to dissolve the National Assembly flouted party policy.

INDISCIPLINE CHARGED  
Faure's ouster was announced in a communiqué issued after a meeting of the Radical Socialist steering committee. Accusing him of "persistent indiscipline," it charged Faure had led "the manoeuvres destined to provoke slapdash elections with an obscure and unpopular election system."

## Three Killed As Canada Marks Safe Driving Day

Two Ontario motorists, killed in highway collisions with trucks, and a Nova Scotia driver killed when his auto crashed with a fire engine, were the only Canadian fatalities as Safe Driving Day ticked into its final hours.

EARL M. BLACK, 29, of New Toronto, Ont., was the first Canadian killed in that period. His automobile crashed head-on with a transport truck near Oshawa at 2 a.m. EST Thursday.

MARITIMES DEATH  
Joseph Lamb, 41, of Dartmouth, N. S., died of head injuries a few hours after his auto smashed against a fire truck on its way to a blaze. Three men and one woman suffered minor injuries in the same accident.

BRISBANE, Australia (Reuters)—Two leading Brisbane doctors were killed and two others and a horse trainer were injured Thursday when 39-year-old Karl Kast went on a shooting and bomb-throwing rampage in an office building.

BLEW HANDS OFF  
Victim No. 1 was George Boland, a Brisbane horse trainer, who was passing through the foyer. He grabbed a bomb in an attempt to put out the fuse and it exploded, tearing away both his hands.
