RULERS OF THE QUEEN'S NAVY WHO GOT SICK ON A PLEASURE CRUISE.

The recent adventure of the Lords of the Admiralty furnishes a standing joke in official and club circles. Immediately after the conclusion of the debate on Mr. Parnell's Land bill, Lord George Hamilton, First Lord of the Admiralty, with a party, comprising Lord Charles Beresford, Admiral Sir A. Hood, Mr. Ashmead Bartlett, Junior Lord of the Admiralty; Mr. A. B. Farwood, Secretary to the Admiralty and others, started on the customary cruise of inspection annually indulged in by the Admiralty Lords. Everything had been arranged for the party to proceed to Devonport, Pembroke and Queenstown, and extended their cruise around Ireland and the coast of Scotland; but the majority of the party being confined to their state rooms, had already had enough of the sea, and declined to go further. Accordingly they landed at Portsmouth and, returned to London by rail, a most welcome looking crowd, whose pale, grave faces bore no traces of the ruddy complexion and happy expression which characterized them when the party started. The permanent officials in the Admiralty Office have suddenly developed a fondness for singing and whistling the music of "Pinafore" and display great unanimity in selection of that part of Gilbert & Sullivan's opera which conveys the advice to, "Stick to your desks and never go to sea, and you all may be rulers of the Queen's navy."
