Barny Barnato, whose suicide was reported yesterday, was an English Jew and illustrated in an extraordinary way, the financial genius of his race. Up to the time when his fortunes began to decline he made money by leaps and bounds; at its zenith, it was estimated that he controlled interests worth in the neighborhood of a hundred million pounds. It was the fashion to call him the richest man in the world; at that time he was virtually the king of the money market. Barnato was born in London. He was a younger son, and at the age of 20 went to South Africa, then a much more savage territory than it is now, and but scantily populated by Englishmen or persons of English descent, to seek his fortune.

FAMINE AND PLAGUE.

Advices by the steamer Empress of Japan say: "The fatalities from famine and plague are appalling. The famine north and east of Szechuan is causing many deaths. A traveller who has just returned from these reports having seen numbers of dead bodies lying unattended to. In one large town half the population had perished from starvation and the fever that follows in its wake."

"The Government have sent 120,000 piculs of rice by way of relief, but grain cannot be got to the sufferers at certain parts, owing to sections made impassable by swollen rivers. Along the route to smaller towns numbers of bodies lay decomposing, while the sky was black with vultures. Small pox is prevalent in Tooghe. Small pox and other epidemics are prevalent in Tokio, while 200 more cases of black plague are reported from Taihoku and Taih-Wan, Formosa. There are some 850 cases altogether."

A smart earthquake was felt at Calcutta a few days ago. Several buildings were cracked. The shock extended to Howrah, across the Hoogli river, where serious damage was done. Several buildings collapsed. Some lives were lost and a number of people injured more or less severely.

In explanation of this, we are told that the sheep of the East will often bring forth three or four at a time and that twice a year. This extraordinary fruitfulness is unknown in Europe or America.
