THE STRIKE SETTLED.—The Briggsville Woolen Mills strike at North Adams, Mass., has been settled by a compromise. The strikers first demanded the restoration of the 18 per cent. cut. The owners offered 8 per cent. and 60 hours' pay for 58 hours' work. The matter was compromised on a nine per cent. raise and the extra two hours' pay.

MARRIAGE BELLS.—A very interesting social event took place at St. Luke's Church, Annapolis, N. S., on Tuesday morning, the occasion being the wedding of Evelyn Constance, eldest daughter of Mr. E. D. Arnaud, of the Union Bank, agent and Mr. Alex. D. Hewar, of Halifax, ticket agent of the Dominion Atlantic Railway. Mr. and Mrs. Hewar will reside in Halifax.

RIBBLED WITH STONES.—The Summerside correspondent of the Guardian has been given to understand that Mr. Hunter's house at Goff's Bridge, Lot 10, was riddled with stones a few evenings ago. Nearly all the windows were broken and some of the stones fell on the lead where Mr. Goff was sleeping. The guilty parties are well known, and action will be taken against them at once.

RETAIL MARKET PRICES.—There was a good attendance at the market today, and sales were lively. We quote prices as follows: cabbages, per dozen, 30 to 35c; eggs, per dozen, 15 to 17c; geese, each, 50 to 65c; ducks, per pair, 50 to 75c; fowl, per pair, 40 to 50c; butter per pound, fresh, 21 to 23c; butter, per pound by the tub, 18 to 20c; pork per pound by the carcass, 6c; potatoes, per bushel, 21 to 25c; oats, per bushel, 32 to 33c; turnips, per bushel, 11 to 13c; mangles, 11 to 16c; hay, 30 to 35c.

A GOOD INVESTMENT.—An exchange says: A brainy Boston, Me., farmer has three cows from which he has marketed 910 pounds of butter since January 1st, and he expects that on January 1st next his record will show an average production of a pound a day each during the year. The difference in the cost of a cow producing 3000 pounds a year and one producing 1000 pounds a year will place at \$50. The cost of keeping one is the same as that of the other. A year's interest on \$50 is \$1.50. The conclusion is that the brainy Boston farmer got 265 pounds of butter for an outlay of \$1.50.

—Apropos of the Congressional "deals" made during the passage of the United States' revised tariff, some of the papers are quoting the following lines: We were a state where men stretch greedy hands, Grasping for place, and palms that itch for pelf; Whose senators have become a marketplace Whose laws are to the highest bidder sold; Where only honesty secures disgrace And honor has no measure save hard gold; Where parties claim the people's sufferance Not for their virtue, but for foes misdeeds; Where public trusts from shame to shame advance, And faction vies with faction in its greed. Quebec has subscribed \$17,000 for a monument to Champlain, founder of the city. Chauncey Wheaton, a wealthy farmer at Waverley, N. Y., was buncoed out of \$5,000 Tuesday by "three card monte" men. Wheaton drew the money from the bank to show that he had it, then won \$5,000 on the game. He saw both packages placed in a box and tied up, but when he reached home the box was empty. The strangers escaped.

The New York Times estimates that the price of the ordinary horse of commerce in that city has been reduced from \$160 to \$120 by reason of the substitution of the trolley for the car horse in the street railways. The price of the family driving animal has also fallen in consequence of the rage for the bicycle. Wheels have evidently more to do with the decline in horseflesh than any other cause.

The Vienna newspapers are famous for the amusing character of their advertisements. Here is a literal translation of an extraordinary advertisement which has been appearing recently: "A young prince, the owner of a lovely estate of great value, has the intention to marry. He seeks a handsome and intelligent girl of about 20 years of age, of good family, and with a dowry of not less than 3,000,000 guilders (\$250,000)—Apply, etc. etc. Manchester, with the ship canal on its shoulders, is not afraid of undertaking further burdens. It has just made Thirlmere, one of the Cumberland lakes into a reservoir for its water supply, which is brought to the city by an aqueduct 90 miles long. So far the cost of the work is over \$12,000,000, and the supply at command is ten million gallons daily. Every additional ten million gallons will cost about \$5,000,000, and the Manchester people count in the end on a water supply of 50 million gallons a day, at a total cost of from \$36,000,000 to \$35,000,000. These are big figures, even for a great and wealthy city like Manchester.

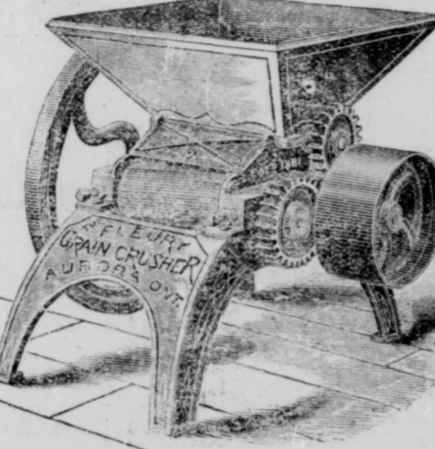
