Canadian News.

A Montreal man has become insane on his receiving a verdict for \$50,000 in a civil suit.

A Vienna despatch says: "The extreme activity of the military authorities seems to point conclusively to the probability of war. It is known that all the Carpathian passes and the roads along the north-eastern frontier of Hungary are being speedily repaired, and all the wooden bridges replaced by others capable of bearing heavy transport carriages and siege guns."
