



**GRADE 8 ART CLASS AT WHARF**

The Marine Wharf in Summerside was the scene of an unusual event on Saturday morning when 28 students from the Grade 8 art class of Summerside Elementary School visited the waterfront to do some painting. Working with water colors, under the direction of Miss Dorothy Ellis, art teacher at the Summerside school, the students took up positions at various vantage points around the wharf area, and choosing their own subject, had a most enjoyable morning while producing some very commendable paintings.

### True Bill Found In Vendor Store Entering, Theft Case

The Grand Jury returned a true bill against Patrick Victor MacInnis of Borden who was arraigned in Supreme Court, Summerside yesterday, and pleaded not guilty to a charge of breaking, entering and theft from the Vendor's store at Borden on the night of February 20, 1957, when approximately \$45 worth of liquor was taken. The trial will begin this morning at 11 o'clock with Mr. D.O. Stewart, Q.C., Crown prosecutor, and Mr. J. Harold Goodwin, defence counsel. Mr. Justice G.J. Tweedy presided as the jury sitting in the Supreme Court opened in the Court House, Summerside, with the swearing in of the Grand Jury, during which he stated that Prince Edward Island has retained the Grand Jury system although some other provinces have abandoned it. Judge Tweedy stated there is much to be said in favor of retention, hallowed as it is by tradition. In the calling to the service of the government to assist in the administration of justice, he said citizens of this community are given an opportunity to see how justice is administered, and take a direct and active part in such an important function of government. After advising the jury regarding their duties, Judge Tweedy referred to the sheriff's report in which he noted 93 prisoners have been committed to the Prince County Jail since the last regular Supreme Court sitting. His Lordship stressed that 59 of these had committed offenses resulting from the abuse of alcohol, and stated that the court would welcome any suggestions or recommendations by the jury to help alleviate this type of offence.

### GRAND JURY'S REPORT

After a thorough investigation the Grand Jury reported back as follows: "We the Grand Jurors have inspected the Court House and Prince County Jail very carefully and wish to make the following observations and recommendations: (1) The interior of the Court House is in good repair and condition, except that the floors of both court rooms require sanding and resurfacing. Broken plaster in the ceilings of the registry office, the County Court room and the library require attention and appears to be resulting from radiator leaks on the floors above. (2) The exterior of the Court House requires immediate attention. (a) Window sashes need repair and painting. (b) Eaves-troughs should be replaced and lowered from their present position in order to avoid ice-slides from the roof; (c) Retaining walls surrounding the sunken areas at both sides of the building are caving in; (d) The coal door at the west end of its shaft offers an easy means of escape from the goal; (e) A dividing fence should be erected on the south side of the building, as is already in place on the north side, to prevent prisoners from having access to the part of the grounds immediately beneath the windows of the registry office. (3) The general condition of the goal appears to be reasonably good. There is an obvious effort on the part of the gaoler to keep his prisoners under decent living conditions. As proof of this, one cell was found to be very neat and clean. In order to assist the gaoler in keeping these conditions up to a proper standard, the following recommendations are made with deep conviction regarding their immediate need: (a) The toilet adjacent to the kitchen should be removed; (b) The toilets and washing facilities at the east end of the cell-block are certainly inadequate and need the following additions and alterations: At the present time the only sink available has to be used for the prisoners' ablutions and for washing their clothes. It is recommended that set tubs be installed for clothes washing; the one toilet is inadequate and an additional one should be installed; (3) the drains from all fixtures in this area appear to be easily clogged and should be examined to ascertain whether this is the fault of the system or of the prisoners. (4) A bad condition is apparent due to no facilities being available to prisoners for occupying or making profitable use of their time while serving their terms. The result of this obviously leads to slovenliness and degeneration and we consider it the duty of the authorities to make provision for suitable employment. (5) The increasing traffic on our highways is causing a more serious problem each year due to the operation of motor vehicles while under the influence of liquor. It is strongly recommended that there be more stringent enforcement of the laws regarding this. (6) The traffic congestion on Central Street on certain occasions is causing a considerable problem and it is recommended that sufficient space be appropriated from the Court House grounds to provide a suitable parking space. His Lordship thanked the jury for their great care in preparing their report which he stated was complete and thorough and contained excellent suggestions.

### Pioneer Dies In Saskatchewan

death came suddenly on Sunday May 5th, to Harry Edmund Clark Webster, another of the Imperial district pioneers of Saskatchewan. The deceased was born in Norrebro, Prince Edward Island on June 9, 1854. He came west in 1905 and homesteaded just west of where the village of Imperial now stands. He was married to Annie Campbell of Freetown, Prince Edward Island, at Winnipeg on August 15, 1911. To this union five children were born, three daughters and two sons.

Prior to his marriage the late Mr. Webster joined in partnership with Jack Davy and together they built Imperial Hotel, which they operated for approximately one year. Following this Mr. Webster was engaged in the real estate business in Imperial. A short time later Mr. and Mrs. Webster took up farming in the Ohio district. They resided on the farm until the fall of 1950 when they retired to take up residence in the village of Imperial.

Mr. Webster had been an active member of the Wheat Pool, and was secretary of the Imperial Co-operative Association for several years. He had also served on the Ohio School Board for many years. Mr. Webster will be greatly missed in the community as he had taken an active part in all projects that worked for its betterment. Funeral services were held from the United Church on Tuesday, May 7th, with Rev. J. Mayne officiating. Interment was made in Imperial cemetery.

The pallbearers were Norman Coultter, Bill Lewis, Omer Etter, Villas Smith, Frank Oliver and Howard Waugh. Deceased leaves to mourn his wife, three daughters, Mrs. Lorne Wilcox, (Dorothy) of St. John's, Mrs. Wilbert Felske (Lois) of South Burnaby, B. C.
