ANN ARBOR, Mich., (AP)—The secret papers on the Salk polio vaccine, scheduled to be made public today, are optimistically expected to herald the beginning of the end of polio.

The secret—whether, and how well the vaccine works—will be disclosed at 10:20 a.m. EST.

If the answer is yes, it means success in a \$10,000,000 international search for a practical way to stop paralytic polio.

Guesses as to the vaccine's effectiveness ranged from 90 per cent upward but with absolutely no confirmation.

WONT COMMENT The two men who know the most—Dr. Jonas E. Salk, its discoverer, and Dr. Thomas Francis Jr., its judge—wouldn't comment on rumors.

Should Dr. Francis' announcement today show that the tests in the United States, Canada and Finland have been a success, it will start machinery for mass inoculation.

Connaught Laboratories of the University of Toronto, which developed the pure chemical medium in which the polio virus is grown for vaccination purposes, have produced enough vaccine for 600,000 children and have distributed it for use across Canada.

In the U.S., inoculations could begin, probably by April 18, on some 30,000,000 children, including 9,000,000 free shots supplied by the Foundation for Infantile Paralysis to children in all first and second grades of all schools.

Canada May Go All-Out In Polio Vaccine Output

OTTAWA (CP)—Canada likely will go all-out in boosting production of Salk polio vaccine if the new treatment gets scientific approval at Ann Arbor, Mich., Tuesday.

Health authorities said Monday mass-production facilities already are available at the University of Toronto's Connaught Laboratories and the University of Montreal Institute of Microbiology.

They said federal policy to aid in production expansion will be outlined by Health Minister Martin Tuesday provided the vaccine has been found effective.

Scientists from the United States, Canada and other countries have gathered at the Michigan college town of Ann Arbor to hear the findings of Dr. Thomas Francis, Jr., who has written a report on the vaccine's mass field trials last year.

MASS PRODUCTION HERE His findings will be made known at about 10:20 a.m. EST Tuesday and the policy likely will be outlined immediately thereafter.

It is expected that if Dr. Francis finds in favor of the vaccine Canada will produce enough of it by next July to inoculate 1,000,000 children against the crippling and sometimes fatal poliomyelitis.

COST A FACTOR But the big question is: Is the vaccine effective as a defence against polio paralysis? Many authorities here feel it is. An Ann Arbor dispatcher says college-town questions is that it is highly effective. But there will be no certainty until Dr. Francis makes his report.

Its cost is \$1.50 for each child inoculated. So far Connaught Laboratory costs have been shared by the federal and provincial governments at a 50-50 basis.

The federal view is that Ottawa's contribution is an exception.

Trade Minister Howe On Tour Of Australia

SYDNEY, Australia (Reuters)—Trade Minister Howe of Australia reached Sydney Monday to start a goodwill tour of Australia and New Zealand.

He arrived by air from Auckland, N.Z., where he told reporters during a brief stopover that there was little hope Canada would import dairy products from New Zealand.

However, he said one of the main objects of his mission is to find what other products New Zealand and Australia have to offer.

Howe was accompanied by Deputy Trade Minister W. F. Bull. He was met here by Australian Supply Minister Howard Beale, representing Prime Minister Robert Menzies, and by Premier J. Cahill of New South Wales state.

The Canadian minister will be in Australia until April 24 when he leaves for New Zealand. The primary purpose of his tour is to strengthen Commonwealth ties, he said, adding he would discuss matters of mutual interest—"notably trade issues"—with Australian officials.

At Auckland, Howe said there was little hope Canada would import dairy products from New Zealand though he realized these were the main items New Zealand wanted to sell in Canada.
