

Tiger Error Opens Gates For 10-3 Athletic Victory

A pair of errors by Detroit relief pitchers started a downpour of eight runs that carried Kansas City Athletics to a 10-3 10-inning victory over the Tigers Monday.

A leadoff home run in the fifth by former Tiger farmhand Kent Hadley sent the contest into overtime.

Barney Schultz came in to pitch in the 10th and fumbled a bounce hit by pitcher Byrd Daley. Schultz walked Jerry Lumpe and was lifted in favor of southpaw R. G. Smith.

Smith then threw away Dick Williams' sacrifice bunt. Daley and Lumpe both scored and Williams raced all the way to third.

12 MEN GO TO BAT

Before the befuddled Tigers got out of the inning, 11 Kansas City batters had come to bat and

eight of them scored. The Athletics banged four straight hits off Smith and collected two more off Dave Sisler, the third pitcher to work in the inning.

Hadley, who already had a single and his sixth home run, doubled Williams across. Roger Maris, Bob Cerv and another ex-Tiger Frank House singled before former Tiger infielder Ray Boone doubled off Sisler to drive in another run and Lumpe singled across the final tally before Sisler retired the side.

Daley needed Ned Garver to get the final two outs but received credit for his eighth triumph. Daley yielded single runs in the first and fourth innings, then put down several Tiger threats as his teammates plodded from behind for the ninth inning tie. Gus Zernial, who doubled home Detroit's first run, hit a two-bagger leading off the 10th.

GARVER TAKES OVER

Garver came on after Johnny Groth singled. Garver, still another ex-Detroiter gave up a run-producing single to Rocky Bridges but got the next two batters.

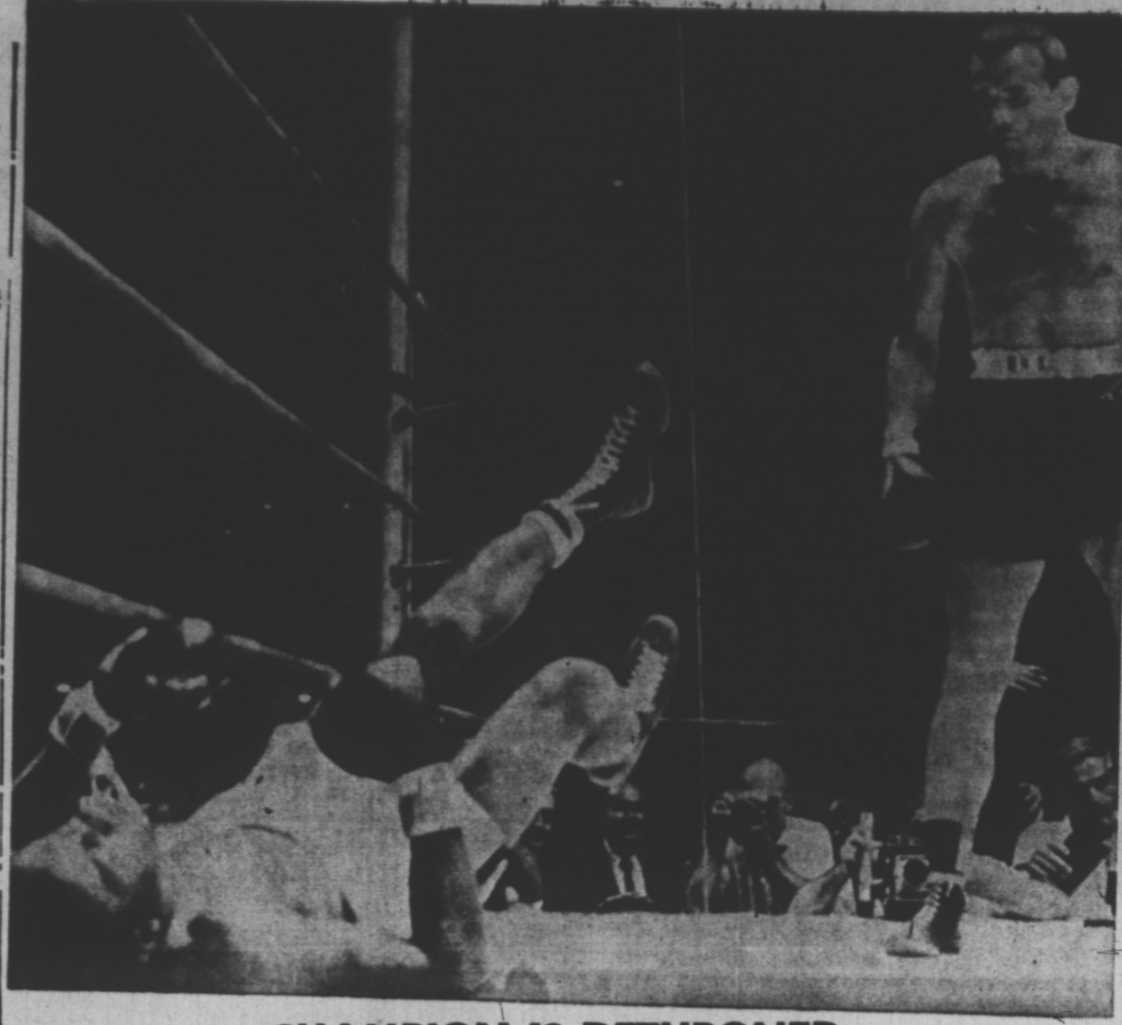

Tom Morgan, his successor, gave up a sacrifice fly that brought home the Athletics' only run until Hadley cracked Morgan's first pitch into the upper right field seats in the ninth inning.

Morgan gave up a single and intentional walk after Hadley homered, but ended further threats by striking out Boone on three pitches.

Kansas City's 10th inning explosion gave the club only its fifth victory in its last 17 games, and showed the Athletics into seventh place ahead of Boston in the American League.

The game was the only American League contest scheduled. One game was carded at night in the National League, San Francisco at Los Angeles.

Tennis Terror Advances To Wimbledon Semi-Finals

WIMBLEDON, England (CP)—Alex Olmedo, the cat-swift Peruvian tennis terror, two Australians and giant-killer Barry Mackay of the United States battled their way to the semi-finals of the Wimbledon championships Monday.

The light-hearted Olmedo, who now lives in California, kept up a terrific pace as the tournament's No. 1 seed in defeating Chile's Luis Ayala, seeded sixth, 7-5, 3-6, 6-3, 6-3.

Australians Roy Emerson and Rod Laver won handily over English and French opposition while Mackay scored the upset of the day by defeating Australia's Neale Fraser, seeded No. 2, by scores of 5-7, 10-8, 0-6, 6-3, 6-1 in a 2 1/2-hour match.

Mackay will meet Laver and Emerson will go against Olmedo in the semi-finals Wednesday. The women's quarter-finals will be played today.

THE OLD ARTISTRY

Olmedo, 23, now the overwhelming favorite, played with the same artistry that enabled him to win virtually single-handed the Davis Cup for the U.S. in Australia at the end of last year.

Only in one department—backhand ground strokes from corner to corner—was Ayala, 26, steadier as Olmedo ripped off stop volleys, pickups, delicate cut shots and booming smashes, combined with a fast, odd-bouncing service.

Emerson put the lid on the hopes of the host country by trouncing Britain's Bobby Wilson, 6-3, 6-3, 6-2 in 54 minutes. Wilson was seeded fourth, Emerson eighth.

Heavyweight Champ Sees Ten-Year Career

NEW YORK (AP)—Ingemar Johansson, freshly crowned heavyweight champion, said he would give dethroned Floyd Patterson a return bout, probably in September, and that he would like to fight for 10 more years.

The handsome, 26-year-old Swede discussed his future plans as he left by plane for a Florida vacation with his attractive fiancée, Birgit Lundgren, and members of his family. He plans to return to New York Friday and leave the same day by plane for his home in Goteborg, Sweden. A hero's welcome awaits him there.

He denied a Swedish report quoting Dr. Gosta Karlsson, his personal physician, that he planned to retire after two more fights. Later Dr. Karlsson said at Goteborg that his statement had been misinterpreted.

"This was only my own personal opinion," said Dr. Karlsson. "I thought the wisest step Ingemar could take would be to retire from the championship after a couple of title fights and accept the generous offers he has received from various film companies."

"Why should I stop now that I am on top," Johansson told The Associated Press, after being

Pistol Pete Runnels Aims At League's Batting Crown

NEW YORK (AP)—Pistol Pete Runnels of Boston, seeking to win the American League batting championship following last season's heartbreaking setback, has fired a .402 average at opposing pitchers this month to thrust himself into the thick of the race.

In seventh place with a .321 mark on June 1, Runnels has climbed to second place at .352 with 41 hits in 102 at bats. Through Sunday's games, he trailed pace-setting Harvey

Kuenn of Detroit by only three points. Kuenn dropped four points to .355 in last week's games.

With three days remaining in the 1959 season, Runnels appeared headed for his first title. But he was overtaken by teammate Ted Williams on the next-to-last day and finished with .322 while Williams won with .338.

Al Kaline of Detroit dropped to third place at .344. He had six hits in 23 tries last week and lost seven points. Nelson Fox of Chicago remained in the No. 4 spot

despite a three point slump to .325.

AARON TAILS OFF

In the National League, Hank Aaron of Milwaukee tailed off 19 points to .381. Except for a three-homer barrage against San Francisco on June 21, the Milwaukee slugger has been losing ground steadily since dropping under the .400 mark on June 17.

However, Aaron's closest pursuer, Bill White of St. Louis, also went into a tailspin. White fell 14 points to .346 with only seven safeties in 26 trips in last week's action.

Orlando Cepeda of San Francisco and Joe Cunningham of St. Louis are deadlocked for third place at .339 and Dick Stuart of Pittsburgh had advanced to fifth with a .337 mark.
