

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

MURDERERS HUNG. DUBLIN, Dec. 15. Patrick Joyce, Miss Joyce, and Patrick Casey, were hung at Galway this morning for the murder of the Joyce family.

NEWS FROM THE CAPITAL. LONDON, Dec. 15. Westgate, the self-accused murderer of Lord Cavendish and Mr. Secretary Burke, has reached England.

A MONARCH DERANGED. CONSTANTINOPLE, Dec. 15. The mental derangement of the Sultan of Turkey is daily developing.

GENERAL CABLE NEWS. CAIRO, Dec. 13. The remainder of the Egyptian force assigned for service in the Sudan has left for that section. The staff will follow tomorrow.

PARIS, Dec. 14. L. Lafargue, of the Egalite, has been arrested in consequence of a speech by him at Berzand inciting to pillage and murder.

LONDON, Dec. 13. Lord Derby, in a speech at Manchester today, rejected the idea of a protectorate for Egypt. England, he said, ought not to remain in Egypt longer than is absolutely necessary to restore order.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Dec. 14. The palace is practically in a state of siege. Nobody is allowed to enter unless summoned. The Sultan's alarm is owing to sedition among the troops, who are angry at the way the palace guards are paid, while they are in rags.

NEW YORK, Dec. 14. Haulan is in the city awaiting the arrival of Kennedy of Portland, Maine, with whom he proposes making a match for \$5,000 a side. As soon as that is decided Haulan will return to Toronto, preparatory to making his New Orleans trip.

CAIRO, Dec. 14. The Government has requested Arabi and the other prisoners sentenced to exile to be ready to start within ten days. Allowances have been granted the prisoners from their properties which were confiscated. Property belonging to their wives was not confiscated. The leniency shown the prisoners has produced a good effect on the Arabs.

DUBLIN, Dec. 14. The Government has issued a circular in regard to distress in the west of Ireland, in which it declares it is determined to rely solely upon the administration of relief through boards of guardians, as it is satisfied that relief works are not only extravagant and demoralizing, but often fail to relieve the most needy. The Government will be prepared to empower boards of guardians to borrow money if necessary to meet pressure on their resources.

KINGSTON, J.A., Dec. 14. The fire, which broke out in the business quarter of the city last Monday evening, was not extensive until Wednesday. The loss, which was first put at 6,000,000 pounds, is now estimated at 3,000,000 pounds. Four hundred stores in all were destroyed.

LONDON, Dec. 14. The Norwegian barque "Alliance" from St. John has been lost at Antwerp.

MELBOURNE, Dec. 14. The Australasian mine, in Creswick, Victoria, has been flooded. Twenty-two persons were drowned.

NEW YORK, Dec. 14. The extensive depot and wharf, together with 60 cars and 10 locomotives of the Manhattan Beach, R. E. Co., at Bay Ridge, were destroyed by fire this morning. A large pile of lumber belonging to the Sea Beach Railway Co., adjoining the Manhattan depot, a canal boat at the dock, the wharf and all on it were burned. Manhattan Beach Co. estimate their loss at \$300,000.

NEW YORK, Dec. 14. Haulan and Kennedy agreed today to race three miles with a turn for \$2,500 a side, each depositing \$1,000 forfeit. Place and time not yet settled.

PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 14. While skating on Abbott's dam this evening the ice suddenly gave way and a number of children were precipitated into the water. Four children were drowned and it is feared others shared the same fate.

SHIP NEWS. The Halifax Herald gives the following particulars of the wreck of the schooner "Mary B." The schooner "Mary B." of Arichat, which left Charlottetown, P. E. I., some days ago with a cargo of thirty-five hundred bushels of potatoes for this port, while beating up the harbor yesterday morning, at half-past two o'clock, during a snow squall, struck on the point north of Finlay's Wharf, McNab's Island. There was a heavy sea on at the time. She now lies full of water with her bottom panned out, part of her keel having come up alongside. The vessel which is insured for twelve hundred dollars in a Halifax office, will be a total loss. The cargo is probably insured but will be lost. A tug with steam pumps has gone to render assistance in getting the wrecked vessel off. The "Mary B." is a vessel of 78 tons register built two years ago at Port Halkettery and is owned by her company, Messrs. Halkettery & Co., of Arichat.

Mend Your Ways.

To the Editor of the Examiner. MR. EDITOR.—The state of our sidewalks and crossings deserve the "sweeping" condemnation of those unfortunate pedestrians who must, perforce, wade knee-deep in the snow to reach their destinations. Two days have now elapsed since we had a big fall of snow, and our "ways" are still very difficult of locomotion, as our people display the most sublime indifference in cleaning the snow away from the sidewalks and crossings in front of their doors. There may be some excuse in the case of the poorer class of citizens, whose avocations may prevent them doing this most necessary work, but there can be no excuse for our rich property holders, those in charge of our public buildings, banks, churches, etc., for perpetuating the nuisance which is most marked in the latter cases. There are plenty of shovels in the town and many willing hands who would gladly do the work for a trifling remuneration. I need not enlarge on the subject. Charlottetown is said by thousands who visit us to be the slowest town in the Dominion. This is not true in main, though we must confess that we are far behind other cities of less pretensions especially in the matter of an efficient water supply, a much needed spreading of paint on our houses, and a general cleanliness of surroundings which sooner or later must have a marked effect on the general health. Just now a stranger among us might be pardoned for the assertion that our city is behind the age, were he forced to tramp along our streets for a mile or two, and observe how utterly oblivious we seem to be in making the sidewalks and crossings passable, and giving the neat, trim appearance which would be presented in any other city after such a heavy snow fall as we have had lately.
