Doctor Francouer began by giving his audience a clear and interesting picture of the gradual development of the science of catechetics which takes into account the impact of one Christian upon another person is certainly not to be overlooked, said Dr. Francouer.

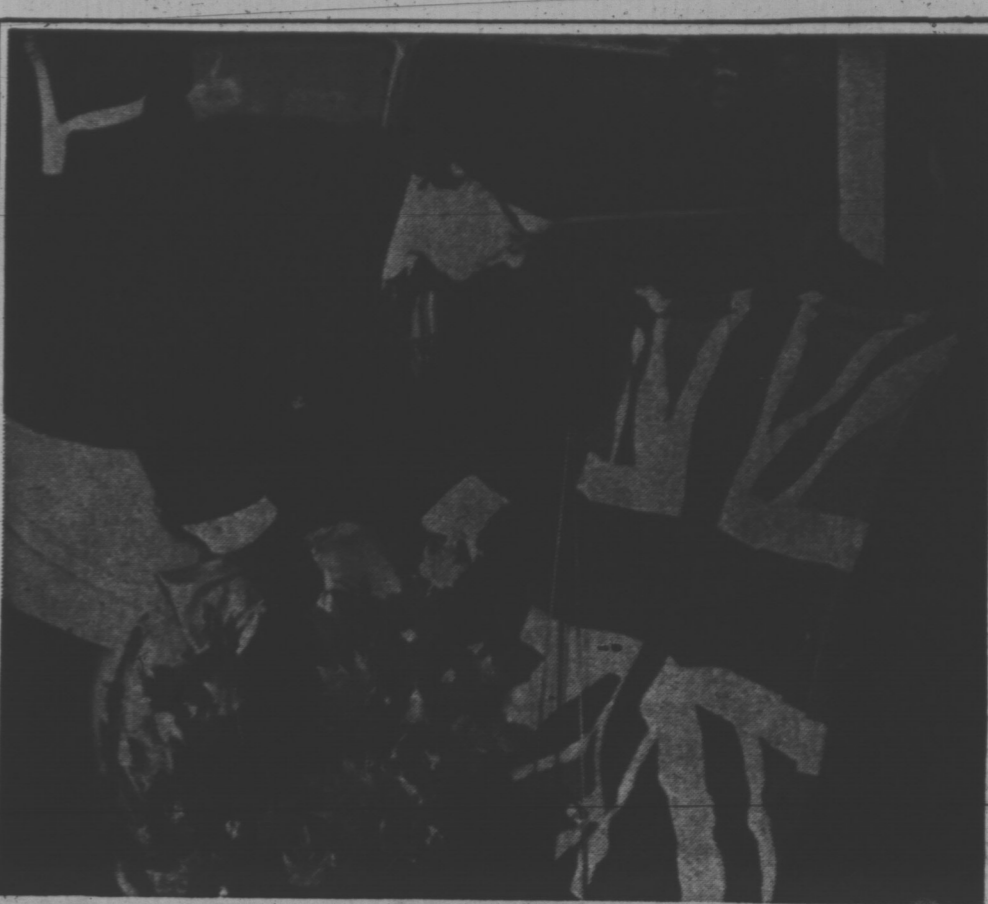
The re-examination of catechetical procedures has produced a movement toward improvement which may be characterized in three stages: the so-called Munich method with its emphasis upon the method and technique used to impart religious truth, the Kerygmatic approach which involves accent upon the joyful good news of the Saviour born into mankind, and, thirdly, Religious Psychology with investigation being conducted into the psychology of the learner, a field which is just now being explored.

In his third talk, Doctor Francouer touched upon the courage needed during this period of change and development. The facing of facts is the beginning of wisdom. The theological insights, and the catechetical turmoil of today result from this complex which many religious educators seem to have must be overcome through a more positive attitude.

In mentioning the totality of the impact of the individual Christian upon his fellow man, Dr. Francouer stated that the power given in Baptism and Confirmation to continue the work of Christ among men should provide a great strength and source of consolation for the individual.

The question periods threaded through the lecture schedule gave ample opportunity for the audience to ask Doctor Francouer specific inquiries, and there were many. Some of the questions provided an opportunity for the Doctor to give his listeners deeper insights into points he had mentioned briefly in his talks.

The words of thanks and congratulatory addressed the guest speaker by Father Simpson were supported by warm applause from those attending the final session of the Institute.

He said Saturday's raiding incident "was all the graver because it came only a few days after the Security Council of the United Nations completed its consideration of a series of outrages committed by the armed forces of our northern neighbor, Syria, or by terrorist bands trained and organized in that country and operating with the knowledge and encouragement of the Syrian government."

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RETURN TO RUSSIA MONTREAL (CP) - A Russian delegation of about 70 dignitaries and reporters, in Canada for the inauguration of Moscow - Montreal commercial air service, left for home Saturday after a week spent in Toronto, Ottawa and Montreal. They arrived in Montreal Nov. 4 aboard the first Aeroflot Tu-114 turboprop from Moscow. The giant Soviet airliners are to arrive in Montreal every Friday and leave for Moscow every Saturday. Weekly Air Canada Montreal - Moscow flights began Nov. 8.

Preparations Being Made In View Of Postal Strike

November 15 is the date set for the postal employees strike, and business and government departments in Charlottetown are preparing for the dislocation that may affect their normal operations.

C.I. Winchester, acting manager of the Charlottetown office of the Unemployment Insurance Commission, explained the action that his department will take in order to maintain full service to the public, if the threatened strike does take place.

All persons filing claims for benefit which would normally be filed as "Postal Claims" and all persons submitting "Claimant's Bi-weekly Reports", which would also normally be sent by mail, or to hand their claims and reports to the UIC agents in their districts, or are to bring them in to the Charlottetown UIC office.

Mr. Winchester said that UIC Staff Officers will pick up the claims and reports from the agents, who are: D.A. Acorn, Cardigan; G.W. Poole, Montserrat; F.W. Johnston, Murray River; Allan Gauthier, North Rustico; Walter Solomon, Souris. In order to avoid delay in the processing or payment of claims he said, it will be necessary that all claims and reports be handed in to the agents or to the UIC office on Monday of the week in which the claims or reports would normally be filed.
