DOMINION DAY.—The principal feature of the Dominion Day proceedings at Toronto will be a military review in which the Queen's Own, Royal Grenadiers, 43rd Highlanders, Governor-General's Body Guard, Toronto Field Battery, 13th Battalion, 12th York Rangers and 38th Battalion will be invited to participate. Judge Messinger is the President. The object of the Union is the promotion of the spiritual, intellectual and social interests of its members. There is to be a reading room in connection, and lectures and addresses will be delivered by leading members.

FIRES AT ST. JOHN'S.—St. John's, N.B., was recently the scene of two big fires. By the first, J. T. Nurse's grocery with its stock was destroyed. There was \$1,900 insurance, but the loss is heavy. Kavanagh's drug store was damaged to the extent of over \$2,000. There was that amount of insurance. Hearn & Co.'s stores were ruined, and Rothwell and Bowring's buildings were damaged. They were insured in the Royal. The greatest loss was by the burning of Leddingham's foundry, on which there was only \$14,500.

R. fast express will be despatched for Halifax, Montreal, etc. It is understood Pullmans will be attached for Halifax and Montreal. It is stated that the I. C. R. fast express (known as the C. P. E. train), now leaving Halifax at 1:30 p. m., will not leave until somewhere in the vicinity of 5:30 p. m., in order to get the Cape Breton connection at Truro.—St. John Sun.

TYPHUS FEVER.—An epidemic of typhus fever is raging at St. John's, Nfld. There have been over eighty cases during the past month. The local board of health did not appear to know what it was, or if they did, efforts were made to suppress the facts, as no information was furnished of the number and locality of the cases, as in diphtheria. But Dr. Johnston of the British warship Buzzard, now on a visit to that port, examined some of the patients and declared the disease to be typhus.

The Canadian Fisheries.

(Daily Bulletin.)

HALIFAX, June 6. Nova Scotia—Cod good at Lunenburg, fair at Canoe and a few at Musquodoboit Harbor and Whitehead. Lobsters good at Musquodoboit Harbor, fair at Yarmouth, Liverpool, Lunenburg and Whitehead, but poor at Canoe. Mackerel good at Canoe, fair at Lunenburg, while boats vary from 400 to 450 at Whitehead, and a few at Yarmouth. Haddock plentiful and herring good at Lunenburg. Light catches of gaspereaux at Yarmouth, Musquodoboit Harbor and Whitehead and a few salmon and shad at Yarmouth.

Cape Breton—Cod fishing reported good at Arichat, fair at Louisbourg, Cheticamp, Mabou and Port Hood. Lobsters fair at all the above places and also at St. Peter's, Mackerel good at Arichat, fair at St. Peter's and Louisbourg, but poor at West Arichat.

P. E. Island—Cod and lobsters fair at Georgetown. New Brunswick—Good catches of cod and lobsters at Macon and Shippegan and of cod and haddock at Campbell. Lobsters and salmon fair at Ecuminec.

Quebec—Cod and lobsters good at Perce and fair at Newport Point. Cod fair at Paspébiac, herring fair at Newport Point and Grand River. Poor at Paspébiac, Perce and Gaspé.

Anticosti—A few herring and lobsters reported taken at Southwest Point.

Brit.—Herring bait by fishermen's nets at Tuskent River and bait traps at White Point, N. S. Ice procurable at Canoe and Georgetown.

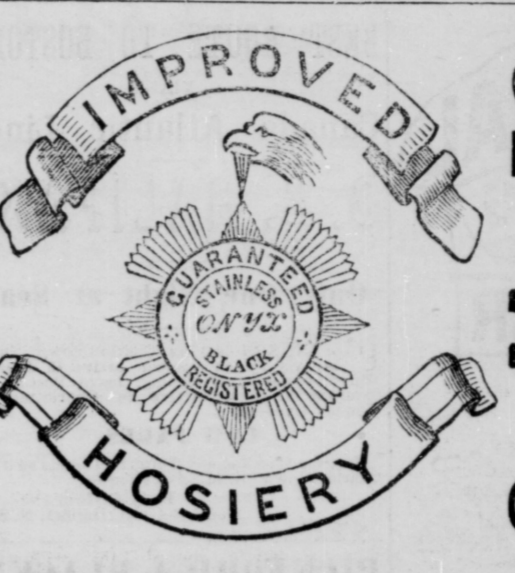
