Annual Meeting Last Night of St. Paul's Credit Union At Summerside

At the annual meeting of St. Paul's Credit Union held last night in the Assumption Hall, Summerside, the president, Mr. Cyrus Poirier, presided and his report to the members indicated that much progress had been made during the past year.

Assets on the financial statement were shown as \$127,925.97 an increase of \$9,496.35 over the previous year.

Mr. Poirier said that during the past eight years loans amounting to \$325,000 had been made by St. Paul's Credit Union and that not one cent had been lost.

The members decided to accept the recommendation of the board of directors that two per cent dividend be paid to the share holders for the past year.

Brief remarks were made by visiting members from the Trinity Credit Union and Community Credit Union, Messrs. Ken Duggan and Harold MacLellan, who complimented the St. Paul's Credit Union on the progress made as shown in the financial report.

Mr. Leo Corcoran, director of credit unions for P.E.I., in a brief talk to the members pointed out that the St. Paul's Credit Union is now the second largest union in this Province, with Tignish ranking first.

Carter Regains Lightweight Championship

By BOB MYERS SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Jimmy Carter of New York won back the world's lightweight championship Wednesday night when he stopped champion Paddy Demarco of Brooklyn after 14 seconds of the 15th and final round of a brutal contest. It was a technical knockout.

Carter, a 3-to-1 favorite to recapture the crown he lost to Demarco last March, battered his rival into submission in the first 14 seconds of the last round.

Demarco weighed 134½ and Carter 135 for the nationally-televised scrap.

The champion was helpless from a barrage of punches to the body and face shortly after the 15th opened. He fell into the ropes and referee Ray Flores pulled him out and turned him around. Demarco was in no condition to continue and Carter's hand was raised in victory.

Carter came from behind after the champion had won the first four rounds.
