and said this could hurt Canada as a nation.

The same tendency is found in today's attitude to various religions, he said. "We now boast of official tolerance."

This results in turning diversity into uniformity, he said. "There is no intention to homogenize, but the end result is the same."

To "homogenize" is to create uniformity and to "humanize" is to create individualism, the rector said.

Following Father Guindon's address, Dr. K. S. Armstrong of Toronto, national executive director of the Canadian rehabilitation council for the disabled, was elected president of the Canadian conference on children.

Speaking alternately in French and English, he said it is important for a conference studying the ways and means of preparing the children of today for the Canadian society of tomorrow to understand and aid the process of human cultural cross-fertilization.

The rector of the bilingual Roman Catholic university said that the aim of a democratic educational system, "in sharp contrast with what takes place in a totalitarian state—is to assist in the fullest possible development of the human personality rather than to shape personalities in the same mold."

FIELD EXTENSIVE

"Yet, in no other sphere of human activity has the movement toward socialization been as extensive as in the field of education.

"I am not referring to the financial and organizational aspects of the education system, where socialization was inevitable as it was desirable, but to its formal, fundamental element, which is the intellectual, moral and cultural unfolding of the child's personality."

Father Guindon said the Canadian educational system is developing in a way that tends to "sink differences out of sight."

Marcoux Claims Not Supported

QUEBEC (CP)—No criminal action will be taken as a result of Dr. Guy Marcoux's statements about the support of Social Credit MPs given the Liberals at the 1963 election, Justice Minister Wagner of Quebec has announced.

In a written statement, Mr. Wagner said Dr. Marcoux, who spoke with him privately last week, has produced "no element of evidence" to justify court charges.

The conclusion follows nine days of investigation by Quebec Provincial Police of information given by Dr. Marcoux in his interview with the justice minister, the statement says.

Dr. Marcoux, Social Credit member of the last Parliament for Quebec Montmorency and Independent candidate in the present election, obtained his interview with Mr. Wagner after publishing a pamphlet on The Affair of the Six under the

title Dans le Meme Sac (In The Bag).

The pamphlet said \$25,000 was offered to a Social Credit organizer if he would find Social Credit support for the Liberals and that Newfoundland mine promoter John Doyle and Transport Minister Pickersgill were in on the deal.

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CONTRACT BRIDGE

South dealer. North-South vulnerable.

NORTH

- ♠ K 7
- ♥ J 9 4
- ♦ A K 7 4 2
- ♣ J 6 5

EAST

- ♠ Q 9 8 2

The bidding:

South	West	North	East
1 ♠	Pass	2 ♠	Pass
3 ♠	Pass	3 ♠	Pass

Opening lead — queen of diamonds.

Anyone can take tricks with aces and kings; the idea is to make the low cards count. Playing your low cards to the best advantage frequently pays good dividends, but it is not always easy to find the most economical way of playing your cards so as to conserve high-card strength.

Take the hand where South went wrong. West led a diamond, taken in dummy by the king, and South played a low heart to the ace followed by a low spade to the king, which held.

But when he now continued

with a spade and East followed with the eight, South made the mistake of covering with the ten, which lost to the ace. West returned a diamond, taken with the ace, and declarer then entered his hand with a club to play a spade in the hope of finding a 3-3 division.

West showed out and South eventually went down two as a result of running into the 4-2 spade division.

Had he made the proper play of ducking the eight of spades, South would have made the contract. He would have made three spade tricks by leading the jack later, and would also have scored two tricks in each of the side suits.

Actually, South had nothing to gain by covering the eight. If it turned out that the spades were divided 3-3, his play of ducking or covering would make no difference in the result.

If it turned out that the spades were divided 4-2 and West had the four of hearts, ducking or covering again could make no difference.

But if, as in the actual case, it turned out that East had the four spades, ducking the eight was absolutely essential to the success of the contract. This distinct possibility should have been exploited by South, since he could not gain by covering the eight and had a chance to gain by ducking it.
