

# Better Deal Is Hinted For West Indies Sugar

 HALIFAX (CP)—Trade Minister Winters hinted at a better deal for the West Indies sugar trade in a speech here.  
 Mr. Winters told delegates to the British West Indies-Atlantic provinces conference he had discussed the sugar trade with Robert C. Lightbourne, deputy prime minister of Jamaica, earlier in the day and was "in general agreement with the proposals outlined by Mr. Lightbourne."  
 Mr. Winters said Canada "will do all possible to bring about a satisfactory conclusion to a matter of such importance to the West Indies."  
 Mr. Lightbourne, also Jamaica's trade minister, said in an interview he had discussed the sugar question with Mr. Winters but declined to give details of the discussion.  
**EXPERT SPEAKS**  
 Earlier, a political science professor and Caribbean expert from Acadia University at Wolfville, N.S., said it is remarkable that West Indies leaders continue to look to Canada for leadership and material help.  
 Prof. Duncan Fraser told the conference, organized by the Canadian National Commission for the United Nations Economic, Social and Cultural Organization and the Institute of Public Affairs at Dalhousie University, that "Canada has over the years given the West Indies little reason to take our West Indian policy seriously."  
 The conference has been called to foster better understanding between the West Indies and Canada's Atlantic provinces and to find ways of increasing co-operation.  
 Prof. Fraser said Canada has contributed through the Colombo plan some \$430,000,000 to Southeast Asia, while contributing just \$25,000,000 to the West Indies since 1958.

## Chartier Sent Recording To TV Station

TORONTO (CP)—Paul Chartier, the man killed in a bomb explosion in the Parliament Buildings Wednesday, sent recordings of his singing to a Toronto television station shortly before his death.  
 They arrived at CFTO-TV Wednesday. They had been mailed in Toronto.  
 The recordings, contained on a single 45-rpm, custom-made record, were of a baritone singing on a single 45-rpm, custom-made record, were of a baritone singing Falling in Love, It's Just a Little Street where Old Friends Meet, and Be My Love.  
 A letter enclosed, signed Paul Chartier, said only: "I would like you to use printed material as you see fit and use records and produce same. I want 75 per cent of all records sold."  
 No other printed material was included except a note on cardboard used in wrapping the package. It said: "Manuscript to follow." The note was signed "Paul Chartier."  
 The package also contained a portrait of Chartier.  
 There was no return address on the brown paper package. A note in the corner of the cardboard, in the same handwriting as the letter, said only "Maple, Ontario, sand and gravel."

## 40 Demonstrators On Hill Guilty Of Disturbing Peace

OTTAWA (CP)—Forty demonstrators have been found guilty of disturbing the peace on Parliament Hill. All but eight elected to spend two days in jail rather than pay \$15 fines.  
 The group, from various cities, held a sit-in in front of the centre block March 4 to protest what they claim is Canadian co-operation with American policy in the Viet Nam war.  
 Among those who chose jail was Mrs. Muriel Azmier, a 54-year-old Ottawa grandmother. Magistrate C. Edward Carter found the 40 guilty after hearing the charge against 23-year-old Joan Newman of Kingston, Ont.  
 By consent of the Crown and defence, the facts in the Newman case were accepted as evidence in the 39 others.

## CONTRACT BRIDGE

 The bidding:  
 North East South West

 Opening lead—king of heart.  
 This hand was played in a team match.  
 Table 1: West led the king of hearts and continued with the queen after East had played the nine. Declarer ruffed, cashed the A-K of clubs, and trumped dummy's last heart.  
 Then, after cashing three diamonds, he led a spade from dummy. East played low and South finessed the nine. West took the ten and was employed. He had to either lead a spade or yield a ruff and discard. As a result, South made five clubs.
