

DOWN THE BACK STRETCH

An important speed transaction was negotiated this week when the 10-year-old pacer Nell Budlong 2:12 3/5, by Calumet Budlong 2:02 3/4, was sold by Fred Taylor, Breadalbane, to Wellington McNeill and son Alfred. Although well matured Nell did not start campaigning until last year when he made 19 starts, was 10 times first and once third, winning a total of \$671.50, making him eligible to the 2:24 pace. He is a big, powerful horse with terrific speed and 2:10 shot for him after a few races. Our attention was first drawn to him when Ike Moreside was working him out at the Charlottetown track early last July. He invited me to step the last eighth with him but the pacer I was driving could not get near him and my eighth was in 15 2/5 seconds. It took a little while for Ike to iron out the kinks in Nell, but towards the last of the season he was unbeatable. At Chatham, Sept. 5th he won the Classified Trot and Pace in straight heats and in Charlottetown, Oct. 8th he was 1-1 from a good field in 2:15 2/5, 2:12 3/5. That was the fastest heat of the afternoon although such good pacers as Babe Britton, Miss Donna Mae, Joseadale Clipper, Silk Hal, Lock Hanover, Sale B. and others were racing. Our best wishes for success go to the new owners of Nell Budlong.

The opening night race meet at Sydney Sport Centre last Friday night drew a large attendance and 26 horses started in the eight races. The fastest mile of the season in Cape Breton was stepped by the pacer Vella La Vella 2:08 1/5—2:12 3/5. She won both dashes with Wilkin 2-2. In the opening dash Douglas Scott, owned and driven by Alex Cameron, Sydney, won in 2:25 3/5. This is a record for Douglas, and the final dash in this event was won by Patricia Direct, owned and driven by Richard MacDonald, Antigonish, in 2:23 2/5—a record for Patricia.

At Truro Raceway, June 18th, the pacer Leah Federal, owned by N. A. Renton of Moncton, and driven by Johnny Conroy, won the opening dash in 2:22 3/5—a record for Leah. She also won the 4th dash in 2:25. The second and sixth dashes were won by Kerwin Hanover, 11-year-old son of Lawrence Hanover, owned by E.

Bragg of Collingwood, N.S. and driven by Lloyd Walker. Kerwin was changed to the trot this year and stepped his first mile in 2:19 2/5 and his second in 2:18—which is now his record. Kerwin Hanover had a record of 2:14 1/1 on the pace and was eligible to the 2:19 class. Another double winner the same night was Single Streak 2:10, owned by Labe and McNeill, and driven by Johnny Conroy. His fastest heat was in 2:15 2/5. In the fifth dash Doctor L. B., owned by Bert Walker and driven by Lloyd Walker, won in 2:15 with the three-year-old pacer Postman, owned by A. D. Napke, Newcastle, N.B. Second, Postman turned the tables on him in the 8th dash, winning in 2:18 with Nova G. Second, Johnny Conroy drove Postman.

Last Saturday night over the same track the 13-year-old pacer Peter Brooke 2nd, owned by Peter Campbell, Halifax, and driven by Chester Smith, won the opening dash in 2:18 2/5 and followed that up by winning the fourth dash in 2:17. Chester was also third with the 14-year-old Peter Budlong 2:09 4/5, owned by Don MacAulay, Pugwash, N.S., in the same dash. The winner was again John Clegg 2:11 2/5, owned by Dr. J. A. Murray of Halifax, and driven by Buddy Cruikshank, time 2:14 2/5, which was the fastest mile of the evening. Chester certainly celebrated his return to the driver's top in quite a striking manner. The 14-year-old trotter, Bruce of Athlone 2:11, that was campaigned in the State of Maine last season, made 24 starts, was six times first, six times second and twice third, showed his heels to seven good trotters in the 5th dash, winning in 2:19 3/5, with Lusticia 2:13 second and Billy Kalmuck 2:13 1/5 third. He also won the eighth dash in 2:15 2/5, which we believe is the fastest heat trotted over the Truro track this season. Lusticia was again second. The winner is owned by C. L. Dauphinee, Halifax, and was driven by Wendy Carroll. Bruce Clegg 2:20 2/5, owned by B. C. Cruikshank and driven by Bud Cruikshank, won the third dash in 2:20 1/5, which is a new record. Second to him was Mollie Castle 2:13, owned by Miss Joan Fraser of Dartmouth, N.S., and driven by Wendy Carroll. Mollie won the seventh dash over the same field in 2:21 2/5.

H. B. MacLeod of High River, Alberta, leaves this week for home, taking with him the two young speed prospects which he purchased a couple of weeks ago. Mr. MacLeod says great interest is being taken in horse breeding and horse racing in his vicinity and that "The Great G. 2021", that was bred here some years ago by B. C. Cruikshank of Halifax from Milwaukee, Wis., and was later owned by David Neima, New Glasgow, is proving a very popular sire. He is owned by a middle aged Englishman, Ruge Parker, who has quite a breeding farm and racing stable. Two of his horses were winners at Edmonton races recently and one of them took first money in a \$700 event. Mr. MacLeod has thoroughly enjoyed his visit to his home here and in the future may decide to spend a month or two annually with us.

Wind and rain played humorous and destructive roles at two of the leading harness racing tracks in the United States a week ago at Louisville, Ky., a playful gust of wind swept off starter Harry Pyle's Demon Hanover hat just after he had given the word Go.

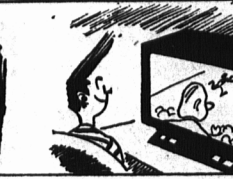
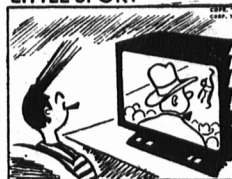

Sea trout, spasmodic in their actions so far this season, are beginning to move into deep fresh water pools at head of tide or beyond that point. Up until recently the migrants from salt water appeared to penetrate the tide and seemed loath to remain behind after the tide ebbed. On Monday morning of this week I was at a noted mill pool in West Prince. The water was clear and one could see bottom plainly when the heavy schools of gaspereaux shifted position.

The Miller, a Navy veteran of the second Great War, told me the first trout of the season had arrived during the night, an even half dozen. It takes a few minutes for my eyes to penetrate the shadowy film that is present even in clear water. If it were not for the slight cloudy roll stirred by the movement of a wide tail fluke many a big fellow would pass unnoticed. They were there all right, but they would not be seen. I would test the best of tackle, found it hard to keep on an even keel and would swim half on its side. I asked the Miller if there was anything wrong with him and he replied: "No, it's because he's so deep on the sides, he finds it easier to roll with the water." I know now why sailors develop a roll.

Two American anglers, if I remember correctly they were from New Hampshire, were whipping the pool with considerable skill but the trout paid no attention to their offerings. They finally packed their equipment and moved elsewhere. As one of them remarked on leaving: "It's too bright for fishing but it's a grand day. We're havin' fun." That's the real spirit of the die in the wool trout fisherman.

Later in the week I was moseying along a tidal river in Queens. The tide was dead low and I walked to the edge of the water. It was a clear day and I could see to the bottom at channel edge through six or seven feet of water. At once a myriad of sea green shapes caught my eye... hundreds of trout were loafing on the bottom, trip here take a nice catch, where from 2 to 5. This summer he visited the same pool and found it almost filled with sawdust, a bare two feet of water covered the fermenting mass of mill rubbish. I informed him that the question of waste matter entering trout streams was in a state of re-adjustment at the moment—in short no Green Light.

This columnist doesn't have to be told about the sawdust nuisance. At the moment there appears to be an utter disregard on the part of the majority of mill operators as to the method of disposal regarding sawdust. The simplest way is to allow entry into the stream and let nature take its course, and that's just what many of them are doing. Many promising streams are becoming clogged with banks of sawdust 4 and 5 feet deep. One thinks they are sandbars and doesn't know the difference until one sets foot in the mess.

It is hoped that one of these fine mornings we'll wake up and discover that the mess of gaspereaux that are cluttering up our trout pools will have departed whence they came. When this event takes place a marked improvement in trout fishing will be noted.

P. E. Islanders Hockey Club Annual Meeting

At a largely attended annual meeting of the P. E. Islanders Hockey Club, held at City Hall last evening, eight directors were nominated to head up the Province's entry in whatever form Maritime major hockey takes in the forthcoming 1952-53 season.

The club executive will be elected at a future meeting of and from those directors who were nominated from the floor by the shareholders as follows: Dr. F. C. Dougan (last year's president), C. M. MacLean, Forrest Clow, Roddy MacDonald, Frank MacDonald, Gilbert Gaudet, Frank MacKenzie, Wallace Scantlebury.

The club's financial statement, one of the most important factors expected to be dealt with at the meeting, was withheld by motion of the meeting. The motion: "That the financial statement not be published for two weeks."

Prior to the passing of the above motion, retiring president Dougan stated: "If we publish a financial statement now it won't do us a bit of good but could do us a lot of harm, for reasons I can't disclose, but if we don't publish it at this time, it may do the Club a lot of good. There is nothing to hide, you can take my word for it."

Although many factors regarding last year's activities and forthcoming ones were widely discussed, regarding players, coaches etc., nothing definite was decided and it is being left in the hands of the new executive. One important motion regarding holding seats was made, however. It was: "If, as and when hockey be continued, that at the discretion of the incoming executive the price of holding seats be raised to a figure not to exceed \$7.00. That an office be opened up town for the sale of tickets and present ticket holders be given first opportunity to re-purchase their same seats."

Stress Two Points
In an address to the meeting, Dr. Dougan stressed two important points which he felt incoming executive should take up and discuss as regards next season's hockey. "If we can utilize local referees (those within the Maritimes) and keep salaries at or below a \$2,000 weekly rate, we can operate successfully on a budget of \$10,000.
