Mr. and Mrs. Ray McArthur, Kensington were host and hostess on Tuesday evening to the congregation of the Presbyterian Church when they gathered in this spacious and hospitable home to bid farewell to Rev. and Mrs. J. A. McGowan who are moving to Silver John, N.S.

When the guests had assembled Mr. Alexander Hiltz, who was Master of Ceremonies called on Dr. Boyd Bearisto to read an address to Mr. and Mrs. McGowan expressing the regret of those present on losing their minister, who had spent nine years as their spiritual leader, and wishing them the best of luck in their new pastorate. Tangible expression of their affectionate, good-will was given by the presentation of a substantial purse by Mr. Ed Dymont.

On behalf of the choir, Miss Marion Lockhart read a short address while Mr. Parmenius Phillips presented Mr. McGowan with a beautiful leather brief case. On behalf of the Young People, Miss Eleanor Bernard presented a silver tray and sandwich set. The young adult group's present was a purse and they also presented Mr. McGowan with a check sufficient to cover the balance owing on the redecorating of the church interior. Mr. McGowan acknowledged the gifts and good wishes and spoke feelingly of the pleasant associations enjoyed by himself and Mrs. McGowan during the nine years he was in Kensington.

Several church members expressed their regret over Mr. McGowan's departure viz. Mr. H. B. McLeod, Mr. Edison Raynor and Miss Marion Lockhart, Rev. L. M. Murray was present and spoke briefly emphasizing the grand cooperative spirit exemplified by Mr. McGowan. A hearty chorus singing "For They Are Jolly Good Fellows" brought this part of the program to a close and a delightful musical program of piano and vocal numbers was greatly enjoyed. Rev. L. M. Murray and Mrs. George Ramsay were the accompanists and solos were sung by Rev. L. M. Murray, Mr. Tyndale Semple and Mrs. Reagh Sutherland. A hearty sing-song and delicious lunch served by the ladies completed the program. A unanimous vote of thanks was tendered Mr. and Mrs. McArthur and family for their hospitality. Farewells of the departing guests were accompanied by fervent good wishes for the future happiness and success of Mr. and Mrs. McGowan and family. The McGowan children were suitably remembered by their Sunday school classmates.

Following is the address: Dear Mr. and Mrs. McGowan: It is with a feeling of deep regret that we realize that this gathering of many of your friends here is a symbol of the severance of the tie binding us together as Pastor and people, and that you have been called to another field for service.

Another page has been written, another chapter in the history of our Church has been completed. In the past nine years, as you so willingly undertook the various duties that arose, not many realize the varied and numerous calls upon the time and energy of both members of a pastoral home and all of these you have met with understanding and fortitude. You have made a real and lasting contribution to the moral and spiritual welfare of our congregation. We, perhaps, sometimes feel that the church is losing its influence somewhat and maybe we are partly justified in thinking so when we see conditions as they exist; but let us ask ourselves what the conditions would be if we did not have a Gospel ministry. Although there may be apparent indifference in our midst, yet deep down in our hearts we realize the importance of gospel ordinances.

Mrs. McGowan has already been recognized by the Ladies Aid and Women's Missionary Societies for her interest in each. We feel that it is not out of place to mention it here as many are present who are not members of these groups. Both of you were instrumental in the organization of the Young Adult Group and greatly encouraged each member in his or her efforts. In Young Peoples and Sunday School work you, Mr. McGowan have been a moving force for good, both in this congregation and the whole Island Presbyterian.

One outstanding instance is the fact that we now have an Island summer camp for the instruction and Christian fellowship of the Young People and the younger groups of girls and boys. You have also helped the choir with many problems and have inspired them in many undertakings which otherwise would not have been carried out. This same enthusiasm has proven a great benefit to the whole congregation. The fact that we now worship in a Church whose interior has been praised by a recent visitor from Western Canada, as the nicest small Church in which she had ever been, is a witness of this.

Though parting with friends is not pleasant, we do extend our best wishes for your whole family in the years which lie ahead. Our hope for you is that your new congregation may early learn that our loss has been their great gain. As a slight evidence of the affection and esteem in which we your congregation and other friends hold you, we wish you to accept these gifts remembering through the years the respect and confidence which prompted them.
