Burma Road Becomes Huge Smuggling Route

By SEYMOUR TOPPING RANGOON, Burma, July 29 - (AP) - The Burma Road - which fed Chiang Kai-Shek's armies with United States supplies for war against Japan - has become the principal overland route for smuggling to Communist China.

One official survey conservatively estimated that about 200 to 300 truck tires a month - or about 10 per cent of Burma's monthly imports of tires from Western countries - are smuggled into Red China by this route.

It is almost impossible to estimate correctly the quantity of smuggled petroleum products but it is believed to be relatively small.

A variety of other priority goods in small amounts are being smuggled into Red China. The bulk of the China-bound contraband goes over the Burma Road. There are lesser quantities going into Red China over countless mule tracks leading over the frontier.

Goods destined for China are shipped by various means to Lashio on Northeast Burma. From that point the goods travel by truck to the frontier town of Kyuchok, where they are reloaded on privately-owned Chinese trucks for transport to Kunning.

Burmese and Chinese traders in the Mandalay area report that the contraband goods are passed by Burmese army, police and customs stations after payment of bribes.

The Burmese Government has made some efforts to halt the smuggling but so far has been unable either to eliminate bribery or spare enough troops to close the frontier.

Claim Chinese Nationalists Make Progress

TAIPEH, Formosa, July 29 - (AP) - A relative of Lt.-Gen. Li Mi said today that Li's Chinese Nationalist forces, which struck into Communist China from North Burma, now control about one-third of the large southwest province of Yunnan.

Official Nationalist quarters assumed an innocent look, obviously trying to give the impression that Nationalist headquarters knew nothing about Li's activities.

The reason for this attitude apparently is that the Nationalists do not want to give anyone the impression of violating President Truman's ban of June 7, 1951, on operations against the Red mainland.

Officials would say only that they had known Li was in North Burma but were still awaiting details of what he was doing.

Associated Press correspondent Seymour Topping reported Friday from Rangoon, capital of Burma, that authoritative quarters said Li had led a Nationalist refugee army of about 15,000 regulars in a 65-mile penetration of Yunnan. This force was reported to have seized a 100-mile-wide border strip.

Topping's dispatch warned, however, that at present Li's operations were regarded as having no more than a strong nuisance value.

Red Cross Swimming Classes

The residents of Conway and Freeland, men and women, boys and girls, are entering the Red Cross Swimming and Water Safety classes conducted by Mrs. Erland T. Ramsay.

This area leads the province in the percentage of adult members in the classes. This is a most commendable effort as statistics show that many drowning tragedies occur among the adult age groups. Aquatic skills are not confined to adolescents. Adults can achieve health, recreation satisfaction and useful knowledge by actively joining the Red Cross classes.

Southport

The residents of Southport are again this year participating in the Red Cross Water Safety Services. Miss Lois Arsenault began a course of instructions at Wilson's Beach on Thursday. A large number of pupils are enrolled in the various classes.

Miss Norah DeBlois, Swimming and Water Safety Instructor is conducting swimming classes each day at Keppoch beach. Keen interest is being displayed in this program and many of the youthful members of the class are looking forward to a film show which will be held next Tuesday.

This year some of the better swimmers are enrolled in a Life Saving Class.

On Yachting Trip Around Maritimes

The 36-foot yacht Riarra of Summerside stopped over briefly at the Charlottetown Yacht Club Saturday enroute to Pictou, Port Hawkesbury and Shediac. Aboard was the owner, G. R. Ramsay, his father, C. W. Ramsay, and two friends, William Mills and Ray Arsenault.

The party left Summerside Friday and plan a voyage of four or five days.

A trim little craft, the Riarra was built by the Rangays. It is 35 feet over-all with an eight-foot beam. It is rigged marconi, two jibs and a mainsail, and draws six feet of water. It has cabin with sleep four and is equipped with electric lights and cooking facilities.

The voyagers reported a beautiful run from Summerside Friday night, and moved up Charlottetown harbor Saturday morning on the auxiliary motor with which the boat is equipped. They departed about noon.

British Prisons Getting Tough With Bad-Actors

LONDON, July 29 - (Reuters) - British prisons are taking a get-tough line with bad-acting prisoners.

The pendulum is swinging away from super-kindness to criminals. In the words of one penal expert, bread and water is being used instead of milk and water.

A recent report from a Home Office committee set up to investigate prison discipline made two main criticisms of existing conditions:

1. Discipline in general needed "tightening", even at the risk of increasing the number of punishments.

2. The policy of leniency, appeasement or soft treatment "as at present interpreted is not having the success expected or desired."

Home Secretary James Chuter Ede told the House of Commons last Thursday many of the committee's suggestions for remedying the situation were already being enforced. Others would require legislation which would be brought before the House in due course.

One of the committee's suggestions was to reintroduce a punishment the use of "restricted diet No. 1" - bread and water. Ede said this would be done in extreme cases.

The committee suggested "restricted diet No. 2" - which now is bread, water, porridge and potatoes - be used more widely once dietitians had worked out a substitute "equally unpleasant" diet which would be more nutritious.

Ede said his medical advisers had the plan in hand.

The committee - headed by schoolteacher H. W. F. Franklin - also wanted to smarten up the appearance and manners of boys in reform schools.

The report has touched off a not controversial among penal experts and the correspondence columns of The London Times are filled with letters from those who approve the get-tough policy and those who feel it is only a step back toward the middle ages.
