Women's Conservative Ass'n President Guest Speaker Here

A representative group of Conservative party supporters gathered in the Clover Club last night to hear a campaign address by Miss Elizabeth Janzen, National President of the Women's Progressive Conservative Association of Canada.

Chairman of the meeting was Mrs. Donald Lidstone, Provincial President of the Women's Progressive Conservative Association. The guest speaker was introduced by M. Alban Farmer Q.C., President of Fifth Queens P. C. Association. Philip Matheson, former P. C. member of the P. E. I. Legislature, and president of the Queen's County P. C.'s spoke briefly prior to Miss Janzen's address.

Miss Janzen, informed her audience that May 27th was the date on which the forthcoming federal election would most likely take place, and urged all workers to get in the field at once. "It is the undecided, the floating vote, we must contact," the National President declared. She urged the early organization of young people's groups, because "besides the experience of the older campaigners, we need the enthusiasm of youth."

Speaking to the women, Miss Janzen quoted the P. C. national leader, John Diefenbaker who declared "Without their constant support and assistance, this party cannot achieve the destiny it deserves." As an illustration of the power of women in the political field the speaker pointed to the "long and successful fight" waged in Parliament by Ellen Fairclough, M.P., for "equal pay for equal work" on behalf of federal female employees.

Miss Janzen asserted that 1,000,000 new voters come to the polls at each successive election, and warned that the P. C. party must capture a share of these votes if they are to win the election. Referring to the party's national convention held in December, the speaker declared that it came at a "most opportune time in the history of the party," because the "excellent" coverage of the event given by the press, radio and TV, made many more Canadian electors realize that "politics does touch every person and come into every home."

Multiple Sclerosis Society Meeting Held

Mr. A. Gordon Cleland, Executive Secretary for the Multiple Sclerosis Society of Canada from Montreal, and Dr. A.A. McVicar, Charlottetown psychiatrist, were guest speakers at the first public meeting of the P.E.I. Chapter of the Multiple Sclerosis Society of Canada, held last night at the Prince of Wales Col. at Mr. Eldon Green of the National Department of Health an "elfare, chaired the largely attended meeting.

Mr. Cleland in his brief address and answers to many questions which were directed to him by those present told much of the organization which he represents. He explained its work and multiple sclerosis itself, the cause for the society's efforts, are yet very novel in the knowledge of the general public and in many cases, unheard of. Meetings such as the one held last evening are held with the hope of informing both sufferers and non-sufferers of this disease for which, as yet, there is no known cure.

SIXTEEN CHAPTERS He told the meeting that he had become interested in the disease in 1947, a year prior to the organization of the Canadian society which now has a total of 16 chapters from coast to coast. The purpose of the Society is to raise funds through these chapters in order to support medical research into the cause and control of this disease. Previous to the organization of the society there was very little research in multiple sclerosis but since 1948, the Canadian Society alone has spent \$130,000 on its active research. Several projects under the sponsorship of the Canadian Society are presently progressing whereas over 50 are known to be going on in the United States in hope that the cause and a cure for the disease will be found.

Dr. McVicar in his informative talk on the disease itself and what is been done in its regard locally, stated that the Provincial government brings a specialist from Halifax to Charlottetown every two months to examine Island sufferers. Sufferers, it was learned, can receive examination from this doctor by making an appointment through their family physician. A total of 49 Island victims of the disease are known to the provincial chapter which was formed last November under Mrs. George Reynolds as president.

During the meeting the support of the church and its willingness to help the society in every way possible was expressed by Rev. T. Another Charlottetown resident charged with the possession of unlawful liquor was fined \$20, and costs while the case of a C.A.A. Grounds resident, charged with the unlawful possession of stolen goods, was further adjourned until Monday.

S.U. COSTS UP WASHINGTON (AP)—The U.S. government Thursday reported living costs rose to a record level in January for the fifth consecutive month. The new index, for mid-January, showed a rise of two-tenths of one per cent from mid-December. This brought the index to 118.2 per cent of the 1947-49 average.
