**HONORS FOR THE LADIES.**

Ladies are winning their way to the front in Belgium as in other countries, and the University of Brussels has for the first time admitted a lady as a science student.

**A REAL NOBLE MAN.**

Lord Aberdeen has remitted half a year's rent to his Scotch tenantry. This princely present means a loss to the Earl of £21,000. He has had to abandon his plan of extending the railways on his estate.

**LORD GRAMMERS**

resigned his position as Vice-President of the Church Association, after making a vigorous protest against the action of the Council in the Mackonochie case in commencing a new suit instead of simply applying to the Court to refuse its decree. He considered it absolutely wrong to waste the funds for an absolutely useless end. The proceedings had already extended over twelve years, and had cost about £1,200, and the only result of the course now taken would be continued litigation.

Who was the eminent journalist who, returning, or rather trying to return, home in the marvellous black fog on the opening night at the new Haymarket Theatre, offered himself to a policeman in Trafalgar-square as "positively the man who committed the Burton-crescent murder; no mistake this time! He was, I am told, a nervous creature, and had conceived this happy thought as yielding a last chance of finding his way somewhere, and being taken care of until Monday morning. No luck, however, "Won't do!" replied the intelligent officer. "You're the fifteenth to night."

**CAUTION TO CATTLE RAISERS.**

A very unusual case came before the Lord Chief Justice at Warwick on Thursday. A gentleman farmer by the name of Hopkins was indicted for obtaining a £20 prize for a shorthorn bull by false pretences at the Birmingham Christmas Show. The accused furnished a pedigree of his bull, which obtained the first prize, tracing it to the required herd book sires; but it was proved to be false. The jury found against the prisoner, and the Lord Chief Justice sentenced him to three months' imprisonment, with hard labor.

This is hard upon him, and ought to be looked to while a Tory Ministry is still in office. But all the more reason for not being overcharged. Mr. Lumley knocked £75 off his tailor's bill, whereupon I congratulate this Solomon in all his glory—including the wisdom. A quantity of false hair will be worn at the forthcoming drawing-rooms, owing to the Queen's express command that three plumes shall spring conspicuously from the heads of all the ladies who are to approach her. As it is impossible to plant these in the closely braided hair which the better taste of the times has generally adopted, every lady ambitious of appearing at Buckingham Palace has set her hairdresser to work to match her tresses.

**SPIRITS AND BEER IN POLITICS.**

They enjoy a monopoly, and if, irrespective of political considerations, they throw in their lot with the Conservatives, they must not be surprised if the Liberals, as soon as they have the power, put an end to an influence that is organized against them. **UNEASY HEADS OF THE PEOPLE.**

If any of our readers ever had an insane ambition to be emperors and empresses, I should imagine it was extinct by this time. Four attempts within a few months; and such attempts! What a life! To feel no safety anywhere, not even in one's own house, with hundreds of guards within call! To know that many among the inhabitants of the house, possibly among the highest thinking any risk as of little account in comparison with the death in life which they and their nation lead! I fancy that the Socialists will ere long gain one of their ends, and that the present Tsar, unable to bear it farther, will abdicate and resign it to his son. Whether their calculation of more freedom than will be gratified remains to be seen. It will be a case of scorpions against whips, but desperate men will not be deterred by that.

Again: King Theebaw, of Burmah, has suffered from two attempts upon his life within a month. The last one was organized by his mother-in-law, who poisoned some sweets intended for the royal table. During the meal a crow invaded the king's verandah, and Theebaw flung one of the sweetmeats at the intruder, which swallowed the missile, and immediately fell down dead. His suspicions being aroused, the King threw out a quantity of the sweets to the crows in the neighborhood, which ate them greedily and died on the spot; so his Burmese Majesty, on making inquiries, at once sent his affectionate relative to prison.

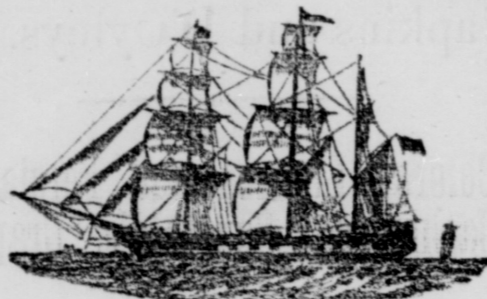

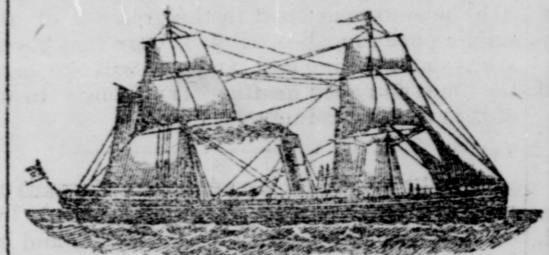

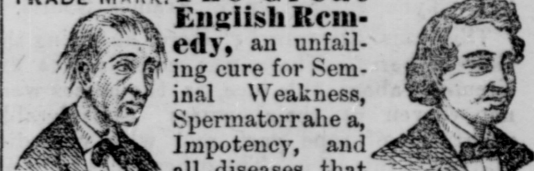
